Standardizing Canadian Eggs.

From present indications it would appear that one of the most important developments to date in the improvement of the Canadian Egg Trade was the action taken by the Canadian Produce Association last winter in adopt- ing definite standards for Canadian Eggs.

Hitherto each market and in most markets each dealer had a system of grading peculiar to his own trade. This resulted in endless confusion to the consumer and great difficulty was experi- enced at times on the part of the producer in finding a satisfactory market for his product.

Realizing the importance of hav- ing definite standards for all live Stock (Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has en- deavored by means of pamphlets, placards, and other means to give the standard for eggs as much publicity as possible. The co-operation of exhibition associa- tions has also been secured, prom- ising that of the Canadian National Exhibition Association at whose Ex- hibition in Toronto this year in response to prizes offered, proba- bly the largest collection of eggs ever brought together in one ex- hibition of the American Conti- nent was displayed. Some 7,000 dozen in all were on Exhibition. The prize list for eggs was pre- pared in accordance with the standards and the judges made their awards according to the ac- curacy of the interpretation, on the part of the exhibitor, of the definitions of the various grades.

"At a number of exhibitions, where no extensive classes for eggs have been offered, the Live Stock Branch has made a display of eggs graded in accordance with the standards, and in each instance has supplemented the display with actual demonstrations, in a candler booth specially de- signed for the purpose; of the way in which eggs of the various grades appear when candled.

In order that the consumers and producers generally may become more familiar with the various classes and grades the following explanation is given.

Three general classes for eggs are provided under the standards: "Fresh gathered", "Storage",

(a) Regimental number.

(b) Rank.

(c) Name.

(d) Squadron, Battery or Com- pany.

(e) Battalion, Regiment, (or other unit) Staff appointment, or De- partment.

(f) CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

(g) British Expeditionary Force.

(h) Army Post Office, London, England.

Necessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, di- visions, is strictly forbidden, and causes delay.

Ontario's response to the appeal for contributions to the British Red Cross is certainly gratifying. This large amount, together with numerous other contributions when put together and viewed superficially may appear big and generous, yet, who has done without a meal or denied themselves a pleasure because of what they have given. Many a man who contributed per- haps one dollar, could have given a thousand, if I think of a whole municipality giving less than a single ratepayer pays for an auto- mobile. An entire town gives five thousand while more than a half dozen of its citizens could each give that much without feeling the pinch, or lack any necessary of life in consequence. We ought to be proud of our Empire, and the principles which she is fighting in defence of, and glad to contrib- ute in any way, even to the half of all we possess, in defence of our country.

He Wasn't a Spy.

Enos Bacon, "the Yorkshire Nightingale," who gave a concert in Shelburne, also in Markdale about three years ago, has been credited by rumor through the West of late as having been a German spy, and the Portage la Prairie, Man., Liberal, deals with the rumor in this way: "A man of the nature and the proportion of the legend of Russian Arma- going through Britain to France has just been laid to rest. Enos Bacon, who visited this city while on tour through Canada last winter, was suffering a punishment as a German spy. The first report was that he was in prison at Montreal, and then it was that he had been shot in London; again he came to life and was in prison in Regina, in which place a gentleman had seen him as he told a visitor who was re- cently in this city. In this case there was every sign of certainty as he had been arrested at Swift River, the only item of doubt about the matter was the specific nature of the charge. The gov- ernor of the prison at Regina stat- ed, in answer to an inquiry, that he had never heard of the man. However, all speculation as to the whereabouts of the Yorkshire Nightingale is at the end, as Rev. W. H. Smith, at whose home Mr. Bacon was a guest when in Port-

age, has received a letter from him. Mr. Bacon is in England, and, at the desire of the War office, is entertaining the soldiers at the ver- tiginous camp; he is booked for this work up to December. In the lat- ter he refers to the reports about him and says that he himself traced their origin to a German settlement in Southern Alberta. He believes they were fabricated to put a stop to his influence in getting recruits.—Shelburne Econ- omist.
