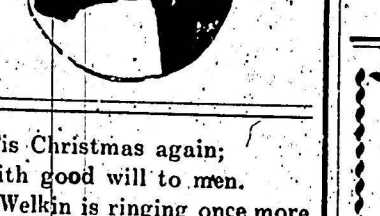

NOMINATIONS.

MARKDALE. At the annual nomination Monday evening, the old Council gave an account of their Stewardship, which appeared generally satisfactory.

The following were nominated: For Reeve, Messrs. T. H. Reeve, R. W. Ennis, W. C. Davis, and J. A. Boyd; Messrs. Davis and Boyd withdrew, leaving Messrs. Ennis and Reburn in the field.

For Councillors—Messrs. Harry Noble, J. C. Kentney, W. S. Perkins, J. A. Boyd, H. C. Duff, C. E. Armstrong, and B. H. Walden. These all withdrew, except Mr. Walden, so there will be another nomination.

Trustees—F. J. Ritchie, John C. Henry, H. Knott, W. A. Neely, and D. J. Henry. Henry withdrew, leaving the other three elected.

Water Com.—W. J. Howard, R. G. Noble, J. H. Stephenson, H. C. Davis, all of whom withdrew. Hydro Commissioners—J. H. Stephenson, L. G. Campbell, A. Jackson, R. O. Whitty, and F. J. Ritchie, the last two withdrew, leaving Campbell, Jackson and Stephenson as candidates.

EUPHRASIA. In Euphrasia, the old Council is elected, but for Reeve, Messrs. Miller and Ellis are out also for Deputy Reeve. James Murray and J. M. Davis.

HOLLAND. In Holland, James McAvoy and Robert Howey are nominated for Reeve, while G. S. Davidson is nominated for Deputy Reeve.

Ladies and gentlemen your vote and influence is hereby respectfully solicited for the office of Reeve. If elected, my best services will be used for the best interests of our town.
