I have a field of oats coming on as nice as any I ever saw in Canada and intend to sow more yet; of course this is the time of year we sow oats, rye and barley; then in March, we plant corn, sweet potato, velvet beans, cow peas, water melons, peanuts and chutias. We let the hogs harvest a large portion of the chufas, peanuts and sweet potatoes, they fatten while doing so. Next month we plant fruit trees of all kinds; I am preparing to plant 200 Peach trees, and 200 orange and a few grapefruit trees for a start, I will also plant a few of each apple, pear, quince, mulberry, conquat, Japan persimmons and pecan trees. The land is rather sandy, but it produces good stuff when cultivated properly. The Country in this part is level, yet well drained. Police Court.

Rex vs. Martin:— This matter came up for trial before Police Magistrate Armstrong on Dec. 3rd and was adjourned to Dec. 16th. The matter was fought out before the Magistrate in the Court-House on the last named date and the case lasted from 7.30 to about 11.30 p. m. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides. George Dundas of Markdale laid a charge against Sylvester Martin of Artemesia Township for shooting his hound on Sunday, Oct. 16. It appears that on Sunday afternoon Mr. Dundas's hound wandered into Martin's swamp and was running hard. Mr. Martin had some sheep pasturing on the farm in a field adjoining the swamp and claims that he had some sheep killed before during the summer time. He also claims that Dundas's hound on this Sunday was chasing his sheep but the magistrate discredited this evidence and found in favor of Dundas. The case aroused a great deal of interest and the Court Room was crowded to the dogs. The complainant contended that Martin has shot his hound without justification.
There are only three conditions under which a farmer can shoot a dog which is trespassing on his property, as set out in our Statutes for the protection of sheep. These conditions are:— When the dog is actually found pursuing or worrying sheep; 2nd— When the dog is found in an enclosed field where sheep are kept, giving tongue and terrifying the sheep; 3rd— When the dog is found wandering on the farm, where sheep are kept, after sunset and before sunrise.
Mr. Martin contended that because the hound was in his swamp that he was justified in shooting it. There is a heavy penalty for anyone who shoots a dog without justification fixed by the Criminal Code. The maximum penalty fixed by the Criminal Code and which may be imposed upon anyone who shoots a dog without justification is \$1000.00.
The value of the dog may also be recovered from the party. The Magistrate gave out his decision on Dec. 24th imposing a fine of \$51.00 and \$7.60 Costs upon the defendant, Martin. The complainant may still sue and recover the value of the dog from the defendant.

Rex vs. McLean:— A charge was laid before Police Magistrate Armstrong by Wm. Ellis of Euphrasia Township against Malcolm McLean a farm laborer for indecent assault. McLean had been working for Ellis, and in the absence of the father and mother the two little girls age 5 and 7 years allege that McLean indecently assaulted them. The matter was summarily tried on Tuesday, December 21st, before the Police Magistrate. McLean pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried summarily. After hearing the evidence the Magistrate decided that there was not sufficient material evidence to corroborate the little girls' statements, giving the accused the benefit of the doubt and discharging him.

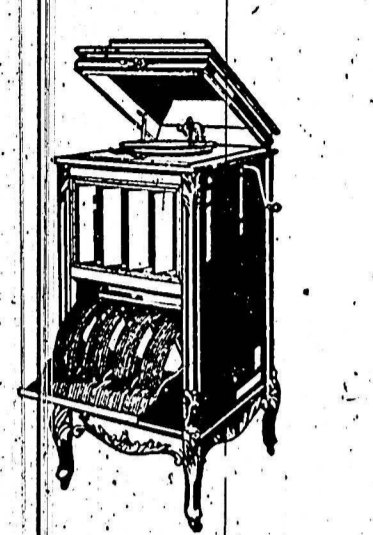
