**OWEN SOUND.**

Rev. F. W. Hollinrake, pastor of Westside Methodist church, expects to move to Hamilton next July, after a three year term.

The Grand Trunk has a gang of fifteen men on tearing up the old wharf, and laying a new one eleven hundred feet long, they also purpose enlarging and renovating the round house.

Owen Sound Agricultural Society at its annual meeting, decided to hold a four day fair in 1916, and to have it a month earlier, viz: on September 12-13-14 and 15, also to abandon the spring fair.

The Dundalk Creamery is getting into shape and it looks as though it is going to be a credit to our neighborhood.—Dundalk Herald.

Mr. Geo. Arrowsmith received a message Monday morning from Grimby, announcing the death of a sister, Mrs. George Tucker, who had been ill for some time. Death was unexpected. Mr. Arrowsmith left Monday to attend the funeral.—Durham Chronicle.

Chatsworth Public Library, which has been on the verge of collapse, has been revived and given a new lease of life. Nine were elected on the Board, four of whom are ladies. This latter strikes us as a wise act. If our Public Library Boards were composed of a majority of ladies, it would certainly be an improvement.

**M. Y. McLean Dead.**

Seaforth lost one of its oldest citizens in the death of M. Y. McLean on Wednesday the 19th. He had attended to business as usual Tuesday, and the end came with startling suddenness. Mr. McLean was born 73 years ago in Waterloo County, Ont., settled in Seaforth when quite a young man, and filled all Municipal positions from school trustee to Mayor.

As editor and proprietor of The Huron Expositor, he spoke to a wide community. He represented 'South' Huron, first in the Provincial Legislature, and afterwards for two terms in Ottawa. Mr. McLean was a Liberal. He is survived by his widow, five sons and one daughter.

**Notes.**

Alberta farmers received about \$150,000,000 for crops last season.

During the first half of January, 15,532 men enlisted in Canada.

Twenty-five Indians of the Cape Croker Reserve, have enlisted for the war.

Brantford will, on the 31st Jan. begin to raise \$100,000 for the Patriotic Fund.

There is a serious shortage of coal in Regina, due to the terribly cold weather.

Final returns of Canada's wheat crop for 1915 make the total 376,300,000 bushels.

M. Y. McLean, of Seaforth, ex-M. P. for South Huron, died suddenly of heart failure.

The plant of the Electric Light and Milling Company of Westport, was destroyed by fire last week.

The total German casualties in the war so far are 2,535,738, it was announced in the British Commons.

The Duke of Connaught formally opened Montreal's campaign to raise in one week, \$1,600,000 for the Patriotic Fund.

Mr. Chas. O. Smith, of Port Arthur, was selected as Liberal candidate for the new Federal riding of Port Arthur and Kenora.

Farm animals in the United States on Jan. 1, were valued at \$6,002,784,000, an increase of \$33,531,000, about 6 per cent., over Jan. 1, 1915.

The report of the Royal North-West Mounted Police shows that the alien situation in the west had been so efficiently handled, that the extra force of 500 men is no longer needed.

Negotiations between the Government and the Grand Trunk in connection with the C. P. R. from Winnipeg to Prince Rupert are expected to be brought to a head, when the Minister of Railways returns from England. Government ownership seems likely.

A Baptist minister in Toronto announced at a morning service recently, that a baptismal service would be held that day at 2 p. m. at the North-end church, as well as the south-end, thus providing for the baptism of candidates at both ends at the same hour.

### New Soger Caps.

The winter caps which have been distributed to some of the men of the 147th Battalion are much more comfortable than those for summer wear. The caps are the same shape as the old headgear, only there is a flap which folds around the outside of the band and loops across the top, where it is held up by a clasp. In a moment the clasp can be undone and the flap pulled down over the ears, and the clasp again holds the band under the chin. ### Modern Snow Plow.

The big new steel snow plow, which belongs to the Owen Sound auxiliary of the Canadian Pacific modern in equipment and in addition to the adjustment of the side wings the point can be lowered close to the track. All the operations are by compressed air and are controlled by small levers in the cupola. This is quite in contrast to the old style plow equipment, which was operated by hand power on heavy levers supplemented by rope and block tackle, which was both cumbersome and strenuous. The new plow is wired for electric head lights. The plow is steel construction throughout. Only the interior fittings being of wood. Mr. Alex Stewart, foreman of the Owen Sound section, has control of the operation of the plow.—Owen Sound Times.

### To Spend \$250,000,000

New York, Jan. 22.—P. P. Murnone, a representative of the National Security Company, has received information that a representative of French and Italian syndicates, on his way from Europe to this country to purchase supplies, the cost of which is estimated at \$250,000,000, for use after the war. The agent, due to arrive here within ten days, is Tito Mazzoni, who is said to have power of attorney given him by the censor of the Bank of Italy.

The supplies to be purchased, as described by a sales and export agency here, include live stock, canned meats and vegetables, cotton, flour, grain, wine, coal, brass, zinc, copper, pig iron, lumber for railroad ties, woolen socks, blankets, draughting and scientific instruments, bandages and surgical dressings.

### Will Make Russia Rich.

If there will be no more liquor, Russia will be the richest country in the world.

This is one of many arresting sentences in an article by General Alexis Polivanov, Russian Minister for War.

The Minister says that the prohibition of the sale of vodka and wine in Russia at the beginning of the war was merely the realization of a long-considered plan by the Czar. In an Imperial Rescript of January, 1914, it was firmly declared that it is no longer possible to place the prosperity of the treasury in dependence upon the destruction of the spiritual and economic powers of a large number of my subjects.

### Aid to Agricultural Colleges and Schools

The grants under the Agricultural Act being supplemental to those from Provincial and other sources make many things possible that otherwise could be considered impracticable by reason of the expense involved. In particular are they valuable in the prosecution of the higher education in Agriculture. By the help of these grants not only are agricultural colleges and schools made more efficient in equipment, but it is made possible to pay men of first class information and experience salaries becoming to their station. Further, graduates who have passed with honours and obtained degrees in our own colleges and universities are induced to stay in their own country rather than go abroad in search of remuneration to which their ability entitles them. Indeed several good men have already been repatriated and have accepted engagements in the land of their birth. How far the funds are being used in this direction is indicated by the following appropriations made from their allotments for 1915-16 by the different provinces immediately for schools and colleges, apart from extension work, short courses, demonstrations, etc.:

Prince Edward Island \$10,050.  
Nova Scotia 27,500.  
New Brunswick 16,500.  
Quebec 60,000.  
Ontario 93,813.  
Saskatchewan 22,800.  
Alberta 38,000.  
Manitoba and British Columbia apply portions of the fund in a similar way but through the public, normal and high schools, and thus the grants appear under another heading than Agricultural schools and agricultural colleges.

### District Representatives' Work.

Among the activities promoted and encouraged by the Agricultural Instruction Act, now in its 3rd year of operation, having come into force in June, 1913, as detailed in the Report recently presented by the Commissioner of Agriculture, and which can be had on application to the Publications Branch, Ottawa, there is none that exceeds in influence and usefulness the work done by the District Representatives. Their duties are manifold and unceasing, but their helpfulness in the agricultural industry is abundantly testified to in every district where they have been appointed, and there are now 15 of them in Ontario alone. It is their not only to be ever ready with counsel and advice on farming subjects, but also to manifest a live and active interest in every undertaking having for its object the better cultivation of the land, the increase of productiveness, the development of the live stock industry, the improvement and extension of educational facilities, the social uplift of the people and the welfare of the agricultural community generally. In short their usefulness can hardly be over-estimated, and towards their support the funds forthcoming from the ten-million dollar grant provided to be distributed among the Provinces during a term of ten years under the Agricultural Instruction Act, is largely devoted. All this is fully detailed in the Report of the Commissioner previously referred to, and which affords instructive reading. Taking the provinces separately we find that the amounts directly utilized for this purpose in 1915 were:

Prince Edward Island \$1,000.  
Quebec 10,000.  
Ontario 80,000.

In most of the other Provinces the system has not yet been organized under the title of District Representatives, but in all of them the funds allotted find a somewhat similar disposition in furthering means for the promotion of demonstration work. In Nova Scotia \$1,200 was so employed in 1911 and in New Brunswick \$11,200 under the title of travelling instructors. In Manitoba, upwards of \$30,000 of the grant of \$51,720 was disposed of by means of demonstrations. In Saskatchewan \$27,148 and in Alberta \$13,591 practically went the same way. In British Columbia \$27,500 was devoted to demonstration work. In Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario besides the amounts mentioned as directly used in the maintenance of the District Representative system substantial sums were also supplied to demonstration purposes.
