Mr. W. A. Noursey, Supt. of Public Libraries, paid a visit to the Library here on Tuesday of last week and gave an address in the town hall in the evening.


We viewed with considerable interest the sun eclipse last week, which though there was some snow in the air, it could be seen most of the time very well here.
