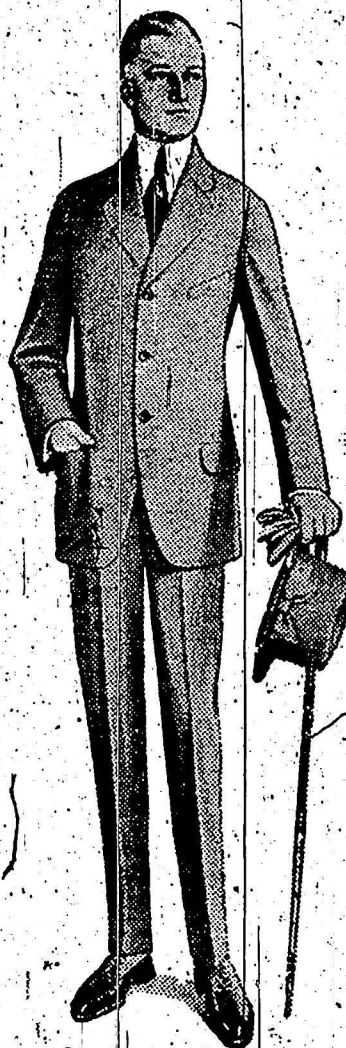

Drainage for Wetness and Drought.

How shall we obtain the most satisfactory soil mixture throughout the year? The great factor in natural or artificial drainage, natural or artificial. Few farms are sufficiently drained by natural means, nearly all require some artificial drainage. The problem then is, "Where shall we place our drains?" "How deep shall we put them?" "What size of tile shall we use?" The position of the drains depends largely on the slope of the field; the depth on the kind of soil; the size of tile on the extent of the area drained and the all or grade given the tile. If you are uncertain about these points, or anticipate any difficulties the Ontario Agricultural College will send you a drainage surveyor who will, if necessary, prepare a map of your farm showing the location of your drains; the size of tile to use, and the grades and depths of the drains. The cost to you for these services will be the traveling expenses of the surveyor, and as several surveys are made on one trip the charge is seldom over three dollars for each survey. Those who have had their farms surveyed and have installed part or all of their drains may have a new plan prepared free of charge if they will return the old plan after marking in all changes made in the original system. On the same terms as those for

surveys, the College will send a man to give you a start on the installation of your drains if you have had no previous experience. He will show you how to set grade stakes, grade the ditch bottom, make the junctions of main and lateral, lay the tile and assist you in any way required. If you contemplate draining during 1916 or are planning for 1917 and need assistance write to the Department of Physics, O.A. College, Guelph, or your District Agricultural Office, state your difficulties and request assistance.

Obituary.

Following is a report of the death of Mrs. W. S. Bowler, former resident of Markdale, and sister-in-law to Mr. C. W. Bowler, of the suburbs. Deceased moved to the west with her husband some thirty years ago. It was with sincere regret that the people of this district learned of the death of Wilmes, Bowler, beloved wife of W. S. Bowler at the family residence, 126 Harbison Ave., Elmwood, last Thursday, March 16th. The late Mrs. Bowler has been ailing since before Christmas and at her advanced age of 77 years, 7 months and 16 days the end came suddenly. The deceased was born in Devonshire, England and at the age of 6 years came with her parents to Canada. Mr. and Mrs. Bowler made their first home in Markdale, Ont., coming west in 1885 and settling on a farm about ten miles south of the town. Like all the sturdy pioneer women of this western land, Mrs. Bowler was indeed a very worthy help mate to her husband and by their united efforts and industry, made a very great success of farming. Some few years ago Mr. and Mrs. Bowler gave up farm life and moved to Elmwood, a suburb of Winnipeg, to reside. A family of three sons and five daughters were born, six surviving the death of their mother. The daughters are: Mrs. D. Graham, Kaleida; Mrs. A. McBeth, Manitowish; Mrs. Carry, Winnipeg; Mrs. C. R. Foley, who died some few years ago and Fanny, who died at the age of four years. The sons are: J. W. Bowler, Kaleida; Harry, also of Kaleida, and Roland living in town. Mrs. Bowler is also survived by her husband. The remains were brought to Manitowish, and the service held in the home of her son, Roland, Bowler, Rev. Mr. Lund officiating. Interment was made in the Manitowish cemetery.
