WEEK'S NEWS OF THE WAR

GERMANY CUTS ARMY RATIONS

Food of Soldiers in Trenches Was Reduced Six Weeks Ago

A despatch from London says: The Danish newspaper Ribtes Tidende claims to have discovered by a month's investigation that the belief prevails in Germany that it is impossible to continue the war to the end of 1916. Many in Germany believe that it cannot be maintained through the summer, the paper asserts, and concludes: "The nations of the German soldiers were cut six weeks ago. Meat is becoming rare, bread is being rationed, and the soldiers' homes are now forbidden to the civilians themselves. Descriptions are numerous, and they include officers. Socialism is spreading amazingly among the troops. Starvation of discipline is evident, resulting from the extremely harsh treatment. The shortage of horses necessitated the reducing of gun teams. Ammunition and arms, however, continue to be produced in incredible quantities."

PREMIER ASQUITH GOES TO IRELAND

Will Consult Civil and Military Authorities

A despatch from London says: Premier Asquith left the Euston station on Thursday night on board the Irish mail train on his way to Dublin. Mr. Asquith is expected to take the reins in his own hands at a crisis by assuming the Secretaryship of War, when the threatened Ulster revolution caused the resignation of Col. Seely. The Prime Minister's finest powers have been displayed in playing the part of a conciliator, and he now has a task which is likely to demand their utmost exercise. He frankly declared that the present situation could not continue.

GENERAL'S DAUGHTERS THROUGH RUT SIEGE

Turkish Commanders Offer to Allow Their Passage Refused

A despatch from Berlin says: The Frankfurter Zeitung publishes a report that General Townshend, the British commander, who recently surrendered at Kut-el-Amara, Mesopotamia, had with him in the fortress his two daughters. They have been sent to Constantinople. The report states that the commander-in-chief of the Turkish forces several times offered them free passage through the lines during the siege of Kut-el-Amara, the paper says, but they refused to accept the offer.

59 SHIPS TORPEDOED DURING THE PAST YEAR

A despatch from London says: Thirty-seven unarmored British merchantmen and 22 neutral vessels were torpedoed without warning between May 7, 1915, and May 7, 1916. Thomas J. Macnamara, Financial Secretary to the Admiralty, said in the House of Commons on Thursday. He added that he understood these figures were known to the American Government.

KAISER ORDERS RESIGNATION OF GERMAN FOOD MINISTER

British Blockade is Pinching the Teutons—Reports Tell of the Shortage of Supplies

A despatch from London says: Several of the Friday morning newspapers print long reports from neutral and German Socialist sources of an acute food shortage and consequent discontent in Germany and Austria. The economic pinch, according to these reports, has become intolerably severe, owing to the British blockade, and even rich people are suffering greatly. The diplomats of other nations in Berlin are getting supplies from abroad. A despatch from Amsterdam says: "Emperor William and Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg have decided that Clemens Delbrueck, German Minister of the Interior and Vice-Chancellor, must resign, says a Berlin despatch to the Frankfurter Zeitung. Minister Delbrueck has been reported ill during the past few days, but the real trouble, the despatch says, is dissatisfaction with Germany's food supplies. Count George von Hertling, the Bavarian Prime Minister, is regarded as the probable successor to Minister Delbrueck."

GERMAN LOSSES SINCE WAR BEGAN

During April German Casualties Are Estimated at 91,162

A despatch from London says: An official British estimate of German casualties in April, issued here on Wednesday, places the total at 91,162. The number of German casualties since the beginning of the war is given as 2,922,079. "These figures were given in the following statement:—German casualties, exclusive of corrections, were reported during the month of April, 1916, as follows:—Killed or died of wounds, 17,455; died of sickness, 2,935; prisoners wounded, 14,567; wounded, 4,001; slightly wounded, 38,979; wounded remaining with units, 5,637. Total 91,162. "These added to the corrections reported in April, 1916, bring the totals reported in German official lists since the beginning of the war to: Killed or died of wounds, 64,552; died of sickness, 11,825; prisoners of war, 137,793; missing, 197,094; severely wounded, 385,515; wounded, 254,627; slightly wounded, 1,023,212; wounded, remaining with units, 117,956. Total, 2,922,079. "These figures include all German nationalities—Prussians, Bavarians, Saxons and Wurttembergers. They do not include naval or colonial troops."

STARVING POLES ARE TO BE FED

British Foreign Office Makes Announcement

A despatch from London says: The Foreign Office on Thursday announced the acceptance of the proposals of the Rockefeller Foundation for relief of Poland. The plan provides that America in conjunction with other many will supply food to Poland until October 1. The German Government agreed not to interfere with foodstuffs imported into Poland. Forty thousand tons of foodstuffs are necessary each month. The management scheme is to be with the commission entirely. The proposal of the Foundation was made by Ambassador Page to the British Government. Russia has agreed to supply the starving people of Serbia, Rumania and Montenegro. The Office made a demand that relief be extended to all Poland, and of the part which Germany has occupied. The consent of Great Britain is only given on the understanding that Germany must cut off her wheat and not export relief supplies of Poland.

GERMANY'S CROPS WILL BE FLEETING

Reason for Poor Yields Through United States

A despatch from London says: The Daily Telegraph's Rotterdam correspondent says according to information he has received, Germany's next harvest is being failed. "It is this hopeless prospect for the future," he says, "that has inspired the German Government to a late peace overture through the mediation of negotiations with the United States. The failure of the harvests entirely to the blockade. German crops will be poor because the soil is impoverished and the British has cut off from Germany all overseas supplies. First of all, fertilizer. In all parts of the empire farmers have reported that their land was not this year better than last year. "With this fact before the Government knows that even if victory in the meantime famine ravages will be inevitable."

UNEMPLOYMENT AT END IN WAR-RIDDEN FRANCE

Great Death of Skilled and Unskilled Labor

A despatch from Paris says: Unemployment which was such a difficult problem at the beginning of the war, is now practically non-existent in France, according to a report issued on Wednesday by the Minister of Labor. On the contrary, there is a dearth of both skilled and unskilled labor, which is keenly felt in view of the remarkable revival of industries, not only of those employed in supplying the needs of the army, but also in civil and export trade. Government statistics show that at the end of January over 80 per cent. of the factories were working at full capacity, and the number of employees actually exceeded by one per cent. the total in normal times.

SPAIN TO BE NEUTRAL TO END OF WAR

A despatch from Madrid says: The Spanish parliament opened on Wednesday, and in his speech King Alfonso announced that Spain was disposed to remain neutral in the world war. Diplomats of the belligerent powers were said King Alfonso, "when all human life follows attentively the developments of this great war, the greatest of history, the Cortes begins its sessions. Spain maintains with each belligerent the same friendly relations and is disposed to continue neutral, this being the unanimous expression of the national will."

PLOT TO KIDNAP SIR EDWARD CARSON

A despatch from London says: A plot to kidnap Sir Edward Carson from Cushehall, County Antrim, where he expected to spend the Easter holidays, has been uncovered by an investigation, says the Daily Telegraph's Dublin correspondent. The plan miscarried. The correspondent adds, by Sir Edward, owing to the pressure of business, canceling his holiday.

BRITISH HOLD NINETY MILES

A despatch from London says: British troops are now holding 90 miles of the western front, it was announced on Wednesday. The British lines extend from a point north of Ypres to a point near the Somme.
