Mrs. (Hawkin, sr. relict of the late Mr. Robert Hawkin, an old resident of Artemesia, passed away after a brief illness at her late home, on the 8th Concession, on Thursday, May 11th, in her 81st year. Mrs. Hawkin was a Methodist and her pastor, Rev.
