Electric Storm.

A severe electric storm passed this way early last Saturday morning, during which the barn of Wm. Humphrestone, east Mountain, Euphrasia, and also the barn of Frank Priel, Holland, were struck by lightning and burned. The wholesale produce and cold storage plant of Lenoir Bros., Owen Sound, was also struck and together with building and contents destroyed, involving a loss of about \$60,000.

Room for Improvement

A stroll through Markdale, or indeed almost any public cemetery will reveal to even the casual observer a lamentable absence of system. This is due, largely no doubt to the lack of permanency of manager. To get the best results it would be necessary to plan and systemize thoroughly, and then work out those plans during following years. For instance, it would first be necessary to sell plots with a view to an annual revenue sufficient to pay a caretaker to keep the whole enclosure in respectable and tidy condition. Then rules for the guidance of laying out plots, erecting monuments, etc., is necessary. How much more attractive would these sacred precincts appear if all plots were as nearly as possible uniform in the surface, with all markers put down level with the earth, so that the mower would readily pass over the ground without obstruction. Regulations also for erecting monuments are necessary, as every base should be of cement, and should go as deep as the bottom of the grave, thus removing the cause of the unsightly leaning of monuments. The appointment or election of trustees or cemetery commissioners that at least one of them could be made, as far as possible permanent, would go a long way in making the cemetery what it should be, an attractive beautiful spot. Then the extension of the cement sidewalks to the entrance would prove a further stimulus and much needed improvement.

Sheep Protection.

An amendment to the Sheep-protection Act recently passed provides that the owner of sheep killed or injured by dogs can recover from the municipality "compensation" equal to the amount of the damage sustained. In place of the two-thirds paid heretofore. This in the event that the owner of the dog cannot be located. Any municipality may increase the dog tax to \$2 for the first and \$3 for each additional dog, \$5 for the first, \$6 for each additional one. This is a very just amendment. There is no good reason why a farmer whose sheep are worried by dogs should not recover the whole amount of damage inflicted.

Report the Fires.

A new regulation requires the fire chief of every municipality that has a fire brigade organized to report every fire within three days after its occurrence to the provincial fire marshal. For doing this the chief receives no extra remuneration, but for not doing it, he is fined fifty dollars. In this report he must enumerate the amount of damage done (estimated cash value); the amount of insurance carried; and the cause of the fire and other particulars concerning it. In the case of townships the clerk of the township is required to forward this information to the fire marshal. The clerk receives 50c. for each report he sends in. From these reports are compiled the fire statistics of the province, and it is hoped, by carefully scanning these reports to soon eliminate a large number of the disastrous fires that mean so much loss in the course of a year.

Mr. Melvin Harris, last week while driving a field, one of the cows lost a fine mare dropped dead.

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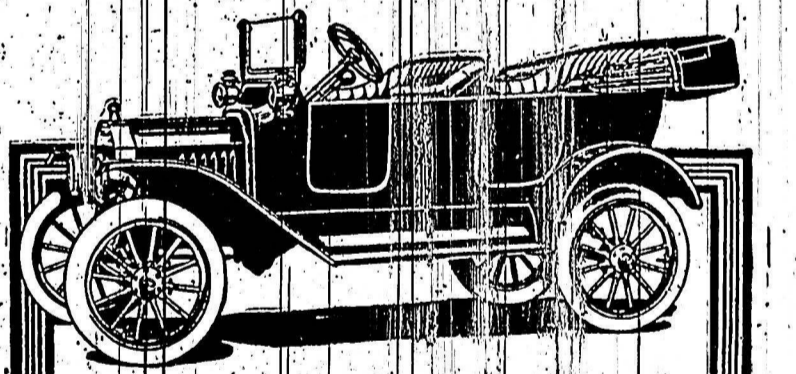
COURT OF REVISION
