As is well-known, hogs have reached an unprecedented high level—\$1.65 per cwt., being paid for red and watered, on the Toronto market. The fact that seven hogs at the figure of \$1.65 per cwt. are being sold for export to England will give a very clear idea of the demand for that product of the pig market.

Without doubt, Canada stands in a better position to develop a permanent trade with Great Britain than has ever been the case before. To do this, however, there must be a continuous supply. There is very good reason to believe that, although prices cannot be expected to remain at the present high level, the demand for bacon in the face of the supply that can be obtained, will be such as to fill the market in a very firm condition, both during and for a considerable period following the war.

The English merchant and fish consumer will buy (and he will buy) quality being his preference. In that he possible exception of the world.
