### Horse Sense.

Ottawa, Can., May 27, 1914.  
Dear Sir,  
The breeding of horses has come a matter of prime necessity before the war commenced. As the horse was a slump in price, owing to national conditions and the cessation of motor power that led to the war game with its demand on horse classes. Following this a precipitous decline in the demand for horses occurred. The result is a serious depletion and a sure scarcity.

The demand is increasing and will continue to increase longer peace has been declared. Canada is to take advantage of the situation the time to start is now. There will be an unusual market demand for foals at working time for mares bred here.

Not only has the wastage reason of war been enormous, but all the belligerent countries, not omitting Great Britain, has either been a partial stoppage or a whole stoppage of breeding, the result of the scarcity of labor.
