

### Soldier's Letter.

The following letter was received by Mrs. Thomas Bradley from her son, who is in the trenches.

June 4th, 1916.

Dear Mother—

Just a few lines this time to let you know that I have been slightly wounded in the left shoulder. We have been in action for the past four days. Just the morning of the day our Battalion was going to be relieved I was hit with a shrapnel in the shoulder. It isn't very bad though. I went to the hospital and got them to let me out after they had dressed my wound, as I was going on leave to England in two days. My shoulder is pretty sore at present, but not at all dangerous, so if you see my name in the wounded list, don't be a bit anxious about me. This is the first time I have been hit since I have been out here, so I have never yet missed a day out of the trenches when our Battalion has been in. There has been quite a number of my chums killed or wounded in our last action. I had quite a time getting out of hospital with my wound. The doctor wanted to send me down the line, but I had been looking forward to my leave. Well I will close for this time, hoping this will find you all well.

Master Kendle Hawkins is very poorly at present.


Mrs. Wm. Hystop is spending a few weeks with her sister Bella, at Ceylon, who is very ill.

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## Conservatives Meet.

Conservatives of the Federal Riding of South Grey and Provincial Riding of Centre Grey gathered here in large numbers last Friday to hold the annual meeting of the two associations, and get a review of the year's work from their Parliamentary representatives. It was the first gathering of the Federal association since Senator Sproule was translated from the Speaker's chair in the House of Commons to the Senate. Hon. L. B. Lucas, Attorney-General, took advantage of the occasion to congratulate Senator Sproule on his thirty-eight years continuous service in the House of Commons. During that time he had labored consistently and earnestly for the welfare of the whole Dominion, and the call to the Senate following his distinguished service in the lower House, was an honor to the man himself, and to the riding that had given him to the country.

The Attorney-General touched briefly on the work of the Legislature at the last session. He outlined the provisions of the prohibition law, and pointed out that the people would have three years experience with it before they would be called upon to vote for its continuance or abandonment.

After a three years' trial under conditions that now exist the efficacy of the measure, as well as its moral results, would be apparent, and the people would not be voting on a mere abstract proposal.
