## Thirty-six Years Old.

On the 17th September, 1880, the first issue of the Standard under the present proprietorship was published. ## Rev. W. A. Graham, B.A.

The death of the Rev. W. A. Graham, B.A., was a great shock to the community. He, with his wife and two daughters had been visiting at the home of Dr. A. M. Brown, whose wife is a sister of Mrs. Graham, and was intending to leave for his home in Toronto, when he was stricken with paralysis and passed away Thursday, Sept. 7th, after an illness of a little more than two weeks.

The deceased clergyman came to Canada from Ireland when nine years of age. He was a graduate in Arts from Toronto University, took his theological course in Huron College, London, and was for thirty-two years in active service in the Diocese of Huron in the following parishes: Delhi, Pleswater, Millbank, Markdale, Shelburne, and St. John's Church, St. Thomas. He was Rural Dean of Grey for twelve years, and Rural Dean of Elgin for five years, and resided from active service in 1910, since which time he has made his home in Toronto.

The funeral service was held Saturday, Sept. 9th, in Christ Church, Markdale, where he had been rector from 1887 to 1900. The Bishop of the Diocese was represented by Rev. Canon Ardill, of Owen Sound. The other clergy present were the Reverend Archdeacon Hill and Rev. J. H. Macleod of Chatsworth, Stevenson of Holland Centre, James of Walkers Falls and the Rector, Rev. J. H. Horsford, B.D. The pallbearers were Messrs. H. Mercer, Thos. Matthews, P. McCullough, T. Elliott, Wm. Lucas and the Hon. I. B. Lucas. The musical part of the service was beautifully rendered by the choir, and Mr. John Dundas sang most sympathetically the solo, "The Christian's Good Night." Amongst the numerous messages of condolence received, were those from the Lord Bishop of Huron, the Rector and Wardens of St. John's Church, St. Thomas and the Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Toronto.

The late Mr. Graham is survived by his wife, who is a daughter of Mr. John Ford of Markdale, and his two daughters: Miss Mary Graham, B.A., and Miss Violet.

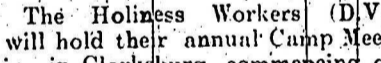

## From H. B. Walker.

Editor Standard.—I suppose you will think by this time that I have forgotten my old town and paper, but not so, although I have not read a copy for nearly a year, as I left Edmonton nearly one year ago and have not read a paper since. Of course it is my own fault, as I should have advised you of the change.

Well I am at present Assistant Superintendent of the Buffalo Park here, it certainly is a great park. We have some twenty-five hundred buffalo, one hundred elk, about three hundred deer and a few antelope. The park comprises some one hundred and forty thousand acres fenced in by a six-foot woven wire fence. We have this year up to date some thirty hundred and fifty young bull calves and we expect they will number about five hundred by the end of the year. The other animals are all increasing very well. This will give you an idea of what this natural park consists of.

We are at present putting up a new building in the neighborhood of the hundred tons, but the building has been very wet and we are not sure that we will not reach our expectations. We have four hundred and thirty-five acres of which is a very nice crop of alfalfa, should average about 65 bushels. We keep forty-five work and at present we have 30 head of cattle. If you are at any time planning a trip through the west, you will be glad to have a few days with us. With wishes to you and your party to remain as ever, yours faithfully, H. B.
