An Open Letter to German Citizens
and Workers.

The Telegraaf, Amsterdam, pub-

lishes particulars of a remarkable

brochure that has appeared in Ger-

many. It is entitled "People of Ger-

many, Awake!—An Open Letter to

German Citizens and Workers." The

author is Dr. Hermann Roessmaier.

The Telegraaf says it has been assur-

ed that in Aix-la-Chapelle alone 5,000

copies of the brochure are in circula-

tion. The author states that he was

political editor of the Berliner Mor-

genpost until September, 1914, when

he quarreled with Herr Rudolf Cuno,

chief editor, who declared that he

who does not help to deceive the peo-

ple is a rascal. The author further

states that Cuno and Georg

Bernhard, manager of the Vossische

Zeitung, explicitly admitted that

Germany provoked the war in order

to gain the hegemony of Europe.

The Telegraaf translates some

passages of the brochure, in which it

is said that in informed circles the

truth is known and the German

was sought to know it. There are at least

1,250,000 dead, about 750,000 pris-

oners, deserters, and missing, and about

3,000,000 wounded, of whom about 1,

000,000 are condemned to incurable

mutilation. That is the bloody bal-

ance sheet of war for Germany. To

day. Concerning those sick they are
