make a personal visit to several groups of farms where hydro power has been in operation for some time. This trip has been postponed we understand owing to weather conditions and the insistent demands of the threshing season.

A trip of this kind would perhaps not show them very much more in the way of equipment than what they could see at Mr. Mercer's, but it would give them an opportunity of discussing power problems with other farmers, who have been through the testing of time.
