FLESHERTON

(Special to The Standard.)

Thomas Carter, M.D.

By the death of Dr. Carter on
Monday October 16th, Flesherton
lost a well-known and very highly
respected resident, who will be
greatly missed in the community.

During the years of his long
practice here he had made many
friends in the village and sur-
rounding township. In the homes

he visited and alleviated suffering
he will long be held in affectionate
memory. He was a man of
strict integrity, kind hearted and
generous without ostentation.

To those of his patients who had
met adversity he was lenient and
helpful in a marked degree, and
many of his deeds of kindness were
known only to those upon whom

they were bestowed. Dr. Carter
was born at Schomberg, County of
York, Ont., and had quite a
young man entered in the study

of medicine in Trinity College, To-
ronto, where he graduated in
1859. He first practised for a
short time at Clifford, then Aven-
dale, from the latter place he
came to Flesherton about 35

years ago and established a suc-
cessful practice. He declined the
position of Coroner, but was
Medical Health Officer for the

corporations of Flesherton village
and Artemesia township. In
politics he was a staunch conserva-
tive, and a member of the Masonic Order,
being a Past Master of Prince

Arthur Lodge here. The day of
his death was the 16th anni-
versary of his marriage to Miss

Eliza Pye of Meaford, a member
of the teaching profession, who
survives him. The funeral took

place at Flesherton Cemetery on
Wednesday afternoon, when a
large number of friends paid their
last respects. Service was con-
ducted at the house by Rev. A.

McVicar, pastor of Chalmers' Church,
assisted by Rev. Mr. McDonald,
of the Baptist church, the pall
bearers were Reeve Mac-
Tavish, W. W. Trimble, R. J.
Sproule, George Wright, George
Mitchell and Hon. T. S. Sproule,
M. D., with whom the deceased
was associated when at Markdale.

Among the beautiful floral tributes
from wife and friends covering
the casket was a wreath from
Prince Arthur Lodge, A. F. and
A. M., and Sprout from the Guild
of Chalmers' Church. Relatives
from a distance were, Mr. and
Mrs. Chas. Pye, Clarksburg; Mrs.
Fulton, Woodstock; Mr. S. Tobias,
Toronto; Mr. Harry Carter,
Schomberg; Mr. and Mrs. Harry
Carter, Miss Emeline Carter and
Messrs. John and Harold Carter
Boudhead. Dr. McWilliams, of
Dundalk, a close friend of the
deceased was among the mourners.
Mr. James Vause, son, one of
the early settlers in Artemesia and
a very highly respected old gentle-
man, passed away after a few
months illness, aged 37 years. The
funeral took place to Flesherton
Cemetery on Friday afternoon,
service being conducted at the
house by Rev. A. McVicar of this
place. The deceased, who was held
in high esteem by many
friends, was daughter of Mr. and
Mrs. Geo. Binnie, of Saugeen
Junction and sister of Mrs. W. J.
Boyd of this village. About fifteen
years ago she was married to
Mr. Talbot, who with two
children feel keenly the loss of an
affectionate wife and mother. The
bereaved families have the sympathy
of many friends in their trial.

The dead are raised—not "will be
raised," but are raised. More-
over, the apostle speaks of Christ
as the "first-fruits." Now first
fruits ought to bear some resem-
blance to the whole harvest, and
what should we learn from this?
Evidently that as Christ rose
again from the dead on the third
day, so will all of us have our
resurrection on or about the third
day. Thus we can imagine our
deceased sister here departed as at
this moment waking to consciousness
in the world of spirits.

"But after death the judgement"
says the apostle. And what does
this mean? It means that the
spirit goes forth and develops into
an angel or a devil according to
the character formed while living

on earth. Those who have made
choice of god and truth, and
followed them and practiced them
in this life, become immovably
fixed in them and go on and get
to be angels. And there are no
angels but those who were once
men and women and children on
earth. On the other hand, those
who choose the evil and the false,
while in this life, who live in the
service of self and the world will
follow selfish ways when they
reach that world until they
develop into devils, and will go
among those who are like them-
selves. If by any chance they
could smuggle themselves into
heaven it would only be torture
for them; they could not stand
its light, because they love dark-
ness rather than light," and they
would be only to glad to flee
from it to the gloomy caverns of
hell. None are devils but people
from the earth, who made a bad
use of their freedom of choice here
on earth. The speaker declared he
never could believe in Milton's
poetic fancy of "fallen angels." It
is a most revolting idea that evil
originated in heaven. A place
where evil could have its start
would be a good place to keep
out of! If it could originate there,
once it could do so again, and
there could be no guarantee of
safety. And it didn't originate
there, but in man's own free choice
of evil. Therefore see to it that
you make choice of good and truth
that when you go hence you may
take your place among the "spirits
of just men made perfect."
