other. What we call death is when the spiritual body is withdrawn from the natural. When a tenant moves out of a house, and it is left vacant, it soon falls to pieces and decays; so does the natural body when its tenant, the spiritual body, leaves it. As for the natural body, it will never be raised as such. St. Paul teaches as plainly as words can teach this when he says: "Flesh and blood cannot inherit the Kingdom of God." He waxes indignant at the bare idea of such an absurdity as a resurrection of the material body. "Thou fool, that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be!" and when we tenderly and reverently place this inanimate form in the ground it lies there till it dissolves and disappears—"It is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body," or "a spiritual body is raised," now, in the present time, not in the distant future, but now. He does not teach that a spiritual body will be raised, but is raised. And so it is in all the Sadducees on this very point, says "The dead are raised"—not "will be raised," but are raised. Moreover, the apostle speaks of Christ, our "first-fruits." Now first-fruits ought to bear some resemblance to the whole harvest, and what should we learn from this? Evidently that as Christ rose again from the dead on the third day, so will all of us have our resurrection on or about the third day. Thus we can imagine our deceased sister here departed as at this moment waking to consciousness in the world of spirits.

"But after death the judgement?" says the apostle. And what does this mean? It means that the spirit goes forth and develops into an angel or a devil according to the character formed while living on earth. Those who have made choice of good and truth, and followed them, and practiced them in this life, become immovably fixed in them and go on and get to be angels. And there are no angels but those who were once men and women and children on earth. On the other hand, those who choose the evil and the false, while in this life, who live in the service of self and the world will follow selfish ways when they reach that world until they develop into devils, and will go among those who are like themselves. If by any chance they could smuggle themselves into heaven it would only be torture for them; they could not stand its light, because they "love darkness rather than light," and they would be only too glad to flee from it to the gloomy caverns of hell. None are devils but people from the earth, who made a bad use of their freedom of choice here on earth. The speaker declared he never could believe in Milton's poetic fancy of "fallen angels." It is a most revolting idea that evil originated in heaven. A place where evil could have its start would be a good place to keep out of! If it could originate there once it could do so again, and there could be no guarantee of safety. And "it didn't originate there, but in man's own free choice of evil." Therefore see to it that you make choice of good and truth that when you go hence you may take your place among the "spirits of just men made perfect."

FLESHERTON

Thomas Carter, M.D.
By the death of Dr. Carter on Monday October 16th, Flesherton lost a well-known and very highly respected resident, who will be greatly missed in the community. During the years of his long practice here he had made many friends in the village and surrounding township. In the homes he visited and alleviated suffering he will long be held in affectionate remembrance. He was a man of strict integrity, kind hearted and generous without ostentation. To those of his patients who had met adversity he was lenient and helpful in, a marked degree and many of his deeds of kindness were known only to those upon whom they were bestowed. Dr. Carter was born at Schomberg, County of York, Ont., and then quite a young man entered in the study of medicine in Trinity College, Toronto, where he graduated in 1889. He first practiced for a short time at Cliford, then at Sault Ste. Marie and Markdale. From the latter place he came to Flesherton about 35 years ago and established a successful practice. He declined the position of Coroner, but was Medical Health Officer for the corporations of Flesherton village and Artemesia township. In politics he was a staunch conservative, in religion Anglican and a member of the Masonic Order, being a Past Master of Prince Arthur Lodge here. The day of his death was the 16th anniversary of his marriage to Miss Eliza Pye of Meaford, a member of the teaching profession, who survives him. The funeral took place to Flesherton Cemetery, on Wednesday afternoon, when a large number of friends paid their last respects. Service was conducted at the house, by Rev. A. McVicar, pastor of Chalmers' Church, assisted by Rev. Mr. McDonald, of the Baptist church. The pall bearers were—Reeve MacTavish, W. W. Trimble, R. J. Sproule, George Wright, George Mitchell and Hon. T. S. Sproule, M. D., with whom the deceased was associated when at Markdale. Among the beautiful floral tributes from wife and friends covering the casket was a wreath from Prince Arthur Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and Spray from the Guild of Chalmers' Church. Relatives from a distance were, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Pye, Clarksburg; Mrs. Fulton, Woodstock; Mr. S. Tobias, Toronto; Mr. Harry Carter, Schomberg; Mr. and Mrs. Harry Carter, Miss Emeline Carter and Messrs. John and Harold Carter Bondhead. Dr. McWilliams, of Dundalk, a close friend of the deceased was among the mourners. Mr. James Vause, sen., one of the early settlers in Artemesia and a very highly respected old gentleman, passed away at the home of his son John, South of the Durham Road, on Tuesday, October 17th, aged 77 years. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon to Cedar Grove Cemetery. Service was conducted at the house by the family pastor, Rev. J. A. Matheson of Pricewood. The deceased was a native of Derbyshire, England, where he was married. His wife died nearly ten years ago. Four sons survive, viz:—James, John and Robert, at and near the old home, and George in the North-west.

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
