British Red Cross.

The Province of Ontario's response to the appeal of the British Red Cross has resulted in a subscription of \$1,000,000 up to date, with a large number of municipalities yet to report. Grey County's contributions are as follows: Euphrasia \$200, Holland \$200, Kippick \$50, Neustadt \$50, Owen Sound \$25,000, Thornbury \$100. They will make a grant of probably \$500 and Hanover is conducting a campaign which aims at raising \$2,500. In addition to these amounts, it is expected that the municipalities not yet represented will be forthcoming with generous contributions, and that the amounts given by the places above mentioned will be supplemented by further contributions from individual citizens, Red Cross and other patriotic committees.
