## A New Industry.

Week before last an advertise-  
ment was inserted by the Mark-  
dale Hydro Electric Power Com-  
mission offering for sale a block of  
power for the operation of a  
up-town grain chopper. We under-  
stand that a deal has been closed  
with Mr. Wm. Walker for a supply  
of twenty electric-horsepower. Mr.  
Walker, who with his family has  
been a resident of the town for a  
permanent citizen. He has given  
satisfaction in his capacity as an  
employee of the local Hydro Board  
and should be popular and success-  
ful in his new enterprise. He has  
purchased from Mr. J. W. Ford, the  
building on Cavan Street, formerly  
used by Mr. Ford in the same  
business. Mr. Ford, whose term  
of operation at the town  
power house expires on Dec. 1st,  
will continue to operate his own  
mill at the lower dam, and has  
sold to Mr. Walker the equipment  
used in the town mill.  
Mr. Walker will install a  
first class-out rolling machine, as  
well as a grinder, and the former  
should prove a boon to the large  
number of farmers and horsemen  
who appreciate proper food for  
their horses. The new industry  
should work out well for every-  
body. It is questionable when re-  
pair expense and depreciation is  
considered whether or not the  
municipality has been a gainer or  
a loser in leasing the surplus  
water power for a chopper. From  
year to year. The waterworks  
commission can have the pumps  
operated for the rent of the house.  
This saving depreciation and im-  
proving the fire risk.  
Taking it all in all, if Mr.  
Walker gives good service, we can-  
not see any flies in the ointment  
for anybody. Mr. Walker tells us  
that he expects to have his new  
plant ready for operation in two  
or three weeks, of which definite  
notice will be given. We wish him  
success in his undertaking.

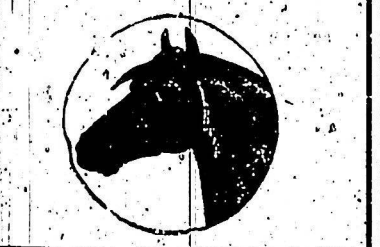

## Letter From France

The following letter was received by Mrs. James Leggett, from her brother, Pte. C. E. McLean, France, Oct. 13th, 1916.  
My Dear Sister,  
Just a line to let you know how I am getting along. I am in the hospital just now with a bayonet wound in my left hand, but I expect to get out tomorrow.  
We went up to the trenches two weeks ago, went over the top and took two lines of Germans. We had nearly the half of our Battalion knocked out, between killed and wounded, but we took about 250 prisoners. When we got over the first line of trenches it was full of dead Germans, and we went on to the 2nd line of trenches, it was nearly as bad. We advanced with yards. We brought out with us 42 German prisoners. All we had to do was to show them where to go, they helped to carry some of our wounded soldiers out for about 3 miles, and some of them were badly wounded too.  
I have been sleeping night and day for the good bed felt so comfortable I couldn't stay out of it. I don't know if I told you or not that I am in the Grenade Section now, that is a party that goes out over the German lines at night and throws bombs into their trenches. It is a pretty dangerous job, but some one has to do it. It is a common thing to get buried up. When those big shells are bursting around you they go about 5 feet into the
