

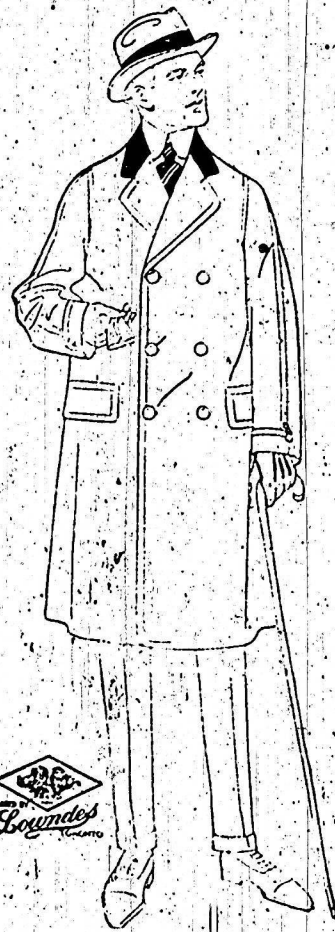

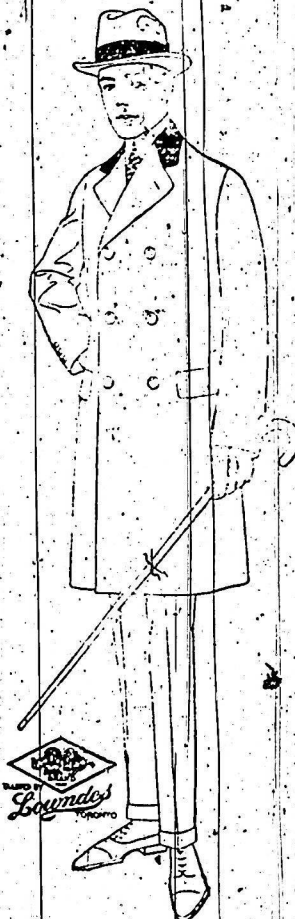

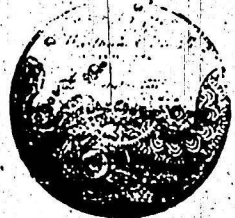

AT THE MOVIES

Eleventh Episode of "The Master Key"

In which Wilkerson recovers the treasure chest from the bottom of the Pacific ocean, but throws away the valuable idol. A visit to the Orient and a tale from the past.

Despite the unusually heavy rains which are sweeping the Pacific coast, Director Robert Leonard, Ella Hall, and the Rex players are working late these nights on the interiors of "The Master Key." Some splendid sea-shore scenes were taken during the filming of the recovery of the sea-chest from the bottom of the Pacific ocean by Wilkerson and his men. A special trip was made to the coast in order to secure the proper atmosphere. Despite the cloudiness of the weather, Director Leonard took advantage of the occasional lulls in the rain to "shoot" old ocean rolling in on the rocky promontories at Santa Monica, Calif., with his players enacting thrilling scenes comprised in the latest installment of "The Master Key."

The Hindu temple scenes, in the eleventh episode of Mr. Wilkerson's serial, were taken in India months ago upon the occasion of Mr. Leonard's visit to the Orient. At that time "The Master Key" was in preparation, but Mr. Leonard thought the opportunity a good one to snap a few scenes with an East Indian atmosphere and native actors, and British sailors in port, were secured to play the roles in the robbery of a native Indian idol from a Hindu temple, an incident of the eleventh episode.

Some difficulty was experienced in securing a native Indian actor, for the superstition of the natives concerning their idols or facsimile reproductions of their lungs and penates is very strong. By bribing one of the more "civilized" of the natives, however, Director Leonard induced him to take part in the scenes which were filmed within sound of the tinkling of temple bells near Calcutta.

Episode Eleven of "The Master Key" is brimful of excitement. It will be remembered that Wilkerson and Dore are both striving to recover the secret to the rich lode of ore in the mine, which secret is contained in a sea-chest, which Wilkerson has recovered from the depths of the Pacific Ocean.

Wilkerson's ship continues to ward land, and he at once forces the chest open and makes a search for the paper, from which he hopes to learn the secret of "The Master Key" mine. He fails to find any such ship, but does find the Indian idol, which he casts aside with the other contents as being worthless.

Meantime, Dore's boat, which has been pursuing Wilkerson's vessel, reaches shore. Mrs. Darnell upbraids Wilkerson for his seeming stupidity, and another quarrel between them ensues. Members of the crew examine the seemingly worthless contents of the chest, and one of the sailors appropriates the idol among other articles, with a view of selling them in port.

Upon arriving in San Diego, Mrs. Darnell goes to a hotel, while Wilkerson remains to pay off the captain and crew. Dore's boat puts into dock and, with the captain and Ruth, he hastens to find Wilkerson and the mysterious idol.

In the interim, the sailor, who his idol, goes ashore with his "ditt"-bag and seeks out a pawnshop, where he may sell his treasures. On the arrival of Dore and Ruth at Wilkerson's boat, another altercation ensues between the two enemies, the respective sea captains interfering. Wilkerson once realizes that Harry Wilkerson has not found the papers.

Wilkerson goes into a town, to cash a check with which to pay the captain. Dore thereupon questions the latter regarding the idol and is referred to members of the crew. He learns that one of the sailors has taken some of the articles in the chest, and the search is at once continued. Wilkerson returns to the ship with the cash, and from the captain learns of Dore's inquiry.

Thus Wilkerson realizes that he has missed the clue to the search. He goes ashore to shadow Dore. A Hindu pedlar visits the pawnshop to sell his wares, consisting of a few oriental rugs.
