[THE sole head of a family, or any male male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available. Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must, appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on pararm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the yicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pra-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price 33.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after carning homestead patent; also 50 adress extra cultivation ir e-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
