(Continued from Page 1) was Mr. Cowan, a lawyer from Dundalk.

Mr. F. West was a delegate from the village of Kimberley and asked that the council consider a petition from the village praying that the village be incorporated as a police village. The petition contained 24 names, only one name of a property holder in the village being on the list. Mr. Paycett stated that the incorporation was desired as the municipality wished to obtain Hydro from the main transmission lines running through the village; and also that they may more effectively look after their water system—which is second to none in the county.

The matters mentioned by both these delegates were promised due consideration later.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

At this juncture the committee reports were handed in. Most of them contained nothing but routine recommendations. The Committee of Refuges Committee recommended the removal from the House an inmate who is said to be unfit to remain there, by reason of suffering from Tuberculosis.

CONSIDERATION OF REPORTS

Road and Bridge, Printing Committees—were adopted without discussion.

With respect to the Special Committee on House of Refuge council went into committee of the whole, Mr. K. B. Miller occupying the chair. It was decided after explanation and discussion, on motion of Messrs. McQuaker and Keith Webster to leave the Committee in charge of the case with power to remove the patient—if she is proven to have consumption.

The general consensus of opinion was that the bylaw respecting admission to the House of Refuge should be amended, and that a suitable place for the confinement of indigent consumptives within the county should be provided.

Other reports were adopted as read and without alteration or amendment.

THURSDAY COUNCIL.

Amongst the communications read at Thursday's session of the County Council was one signed by all of the officials quartered at the court house and by the lawyers of the town asking that the county buildings be wired for electricity as the present system of using gas was not the most healthy and that Judges coming here had several times remarked on the inadequacy of the lighting arrangements.

Reports of committees brought up considerable discussion particularly one presented by a special committee, of which Reeve Sudden of Chatsworth was chairman, recommending that the request of the residents of Kimberley that

that place be created a police village, be laid over. The discussion brought out the fact that there was sufficient population to warrant the request being granted. After considering the matter in committee of the whole the report was adopted as presented.

The House of Refuge Committee recommended that the stables of that institution be remodelled on plans submitted by Beattie of Ferguson and that the matter be considered at the January session.
