Pte. John Moore Killed in Action.

Private John Lyons Moore, who
fell in action on November 15th,

was the second son of Mr. and

Mrs. Moore, of South Porcupine,

Ontario, to lay down his life

at the front within a space of

two months. His brother, Private

Gordon Moore, 87th

Canadian Guards Battalion, Mon-
treal, was killed on September 21.

Private John L. Moore was

overseas with the 8th Battalion,

and was transferred to another

unit. His son's sacrifice has

been mourned by the whole

community.

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
