Ontario Beekeepers' Convention, 1916.

The Annual Convention of the Ontario Beekeepers' Association was held at Hotel Paris-Rite, Toronto, on Dec. 12th, 13th and 14th. The attendance was good every session. The most prominent outside speaker, the most interesting and valuable. Such subjects as Swarm Prevention, Production of Extracted Honey in General Apiaries under one management and wintering were followed by good discussions. The session of honey-gathering this past season has been extremely heavy, although the markets were ill supplied for a short time. The next event of interest to beekeepers is the Short Course in Beekeeping at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. The need of more practical work at a winter time has necessitated adding other work to it and the course will start January 9th and conclude on the 27th. A very attractive program has been arranged and is at present in the hands of a printer. People wishing a copy should write Mr. Morley Pitt, Provincial Apiarist O. A. College, Guelph, Ontario.

Class for Non-Commissioned Offi-
cers Starts February 1st.

February 1st, 1917, will see the
commencement of a Non-Commis-
sioned-Officers' Training Class for
the 248th Battalion, C.E.F. This
is an opportunity for every man to
take the Non-Commissioned-Offi-
cers' training. Each man who en-
lists with the 248th Battalion will
be eligible for this Class. Training
previous to the opening of the
Class will stand you in good stead
when the test comes. It must not
be said of the 248th Greys that
every man did not get his chance;
because, here it is. Remember, ef-
ficiency holds the key to promotion
in the 248th Battalion.

ing the 248th Battalion, speaking

compliment that the "1000 League"
idea was so good that he had recom-

being raised in four other
counties in this military district.

and spoke at both meetings.

A mass meeting on behalf of
248th recruiting has been arranged
for next Monday night at Chats-
worth. Major Rorke will be the
principal speaker. Capt. J. F.
White and Lieut. Kelley will also
speak. The Orpheus Male Chorus,
of Owen Sound, will provide a
musical programme.

Mr. R. Beaton, of the Merchants
Bank staff, will probably receive
the appointment of Paymaster of
the 248th. For this purpose he will
go to School of Instruction for
Paymasters to obtain his certifi-
cate.

Sergeant "Vic" Finlay, of Owen
Sound, who went to the front with
the 20th Battalion, and who was
wounded and has been convalescing
at his home, is to receive an ap-
pointment as an officer in the 248.
Lieut. J. L. Vale, of Owen Sound,
will also be given an appointment.

It is expected also that Mr. Kor-
man, jr., of Hanover, will be
appointed an officer in the battal-
ion. Mr. Norman is at present
looking after recruiting in Han-
over.

Death of Stephen H Leighton.

Stephen H. Leighton died at his
residence here on Wednesday, the
27th of December last, after an ill-
ness which confined him to bed for
several weeks.

The late Mr. Leighton has been
a resident of Markdale for the
past four years, coming here from
the village of Caledon East, where
he had retired and resided for
some time. The passing of the de-
ceased removes one more link in
the early history and the settle-
ment of this country. The de-
ceased had a long, useful and active
career, and had reached the good
old age of eighty-three years. A
native of Ireland, born in the
town of Sligo 83 years ago, he
came out to this country about
the year 1840 when a very young
boy and settled at Sandhill in the
Township of Albion, County of
Peel with his uncle, the late Dr.
Thomas Henry who had previously
come out from the City of Dublin.
In the year 1859, he took out a
first-class teacher's certificate and
shortly after commenced to teach
school and had followed the teach-
ing profession from that time up
until within a few years of the
time of his death. Was a very
active man for his advanced age,
and retained to a remarkable de-
gree all his faculties up until the
end. The late Mr. Leighton was
a man of good education, with a
distinct touch of the gentleman of
the old school, of large human
sympathies, generous disposition
and impulses but modest and
 retiring. The deceased was a great
reader, had a broad and well-in-
formed mind on most branches of
learning and to know him was to
highly respect him. The deceased
was a first-cousin of the late Dr.
James Henry, of Orangeville, who
predeceased him several months.
His life was a true Christian one,
and he was a devoted member of
the Methodist Church. He was a
Reformer in politics. Besides the
widow, one son, Robert H. Leigh-
ton, Principal of the Halbright
High School, Saskatchewan, sur-
vives him.

The funeral was held from his
late residence on Friday, the 29th
of December, to the Markdale Pub-
lic Cemetery. The services at the
home were conducted by the Rev.
W. W. Wallace, Pastor of the Mark-
dale Methodist Church.

Rooms for "Greys" Well Patronized.

MRS. EATON'S SCHEME TAK-
ING WELL WITH GREY
BOYS IN ENGLAND.

The following letter from Mayor
Little, of Owen Sound, con-
taining an excerpt from a
letter to him from Mrs. Annie
Eaton referring to her work in
London for opening a set of rooms
there for the use of Grey Boys in
England is of special interest es-
pecially to families with boys in
training there and to Grey men
shortly bound for overseas. The
advantages of such a meeting
place are at once apparent. Boys
of various units on leave or sick
leave may drop in at the rooms
and there renew acquaintances and
chat over mutual friends in Cana-
da.

The letter from the Mayor fol-
lows: Editor, The Standard—
Dear Sir—I have just received a
letter from Mrs. Annie Eaton, for-
merly of Owen Sound, who is now
with other ladies, interested in
the reception rooms for the Grey
County soldiers in London, Eng-
land. This place of meeting seems
to be a great comfort to the sol-
diers in England and it is the de-
sire of Mrs. Eaton and those as-
sociated with her that none of the
soldiers from Grey County should
be unaware of their desire to have
them make these rooms a sort of
home while in London. You will
see from the portion of her letter
quoted below what she would like
and feel sure that all of you can

do to co-operate with her and her
associates in this work will be
done. Her letter runs as follows:—
"During the two weeks since the
beginning of the Battalion's leave
182 men have registered in our
Visitors' home. Most of these have
made the rooms their headquarters
and have made me realize that they
felt it to be a little bit of home
in Old London."

"Will you kindly have an ac-
count of the rooms put in the
papers throughout the County so
that none of the Grey boys may
miss us for lack of information,
and ask the editors if they will
please send me copies of the local
papers."

"I shall be glad if the rela-
tives at home will avail themselves
of our services in visiting the un-
fortunate ones in the hospitals or
in supplying information about
their boys."

The papers referred to should be
addressed to Canadian Grey's
Rooms, Royal Colonial Chambers,
18, 21, 23, 25, 27, 29, Cannon Street, London,
W. C. England."

I trust that you will give this
enterprise Mrs. Eaton and her
friends the publicity through your
paper that they deserve and so as-
sist in getting all Grey County sol-
diers know that they will be wel-
come at the Canadian Grey's
Rooms, wherever they are in Lon-
don.
