The funeral, a very large one, despite the storm, took place on Sunday afternoon. The service was a specially comforting one, conducted by her pastor, Rev. E. S. Moyer and the sanctity of the service was enhanced by the rendering of "Shadows," sweetly and tenderly sung by Miss Irene Wilson, Mr. A. Bell and the pastor.
