

FACING A GREAT NATIONAL CRISIS

OUR GREAT BRITAIN PREPARED FOR WORLD-WAR.

Before Has the World Seen Such Astounding Effort on the Part of Any Nation.

A Canadian visitor to England at the outbreak of war, says: "I found the whole nation straining to expand its war mobilization. Britain was sending volunteer battalions at a rate unequalled in history. In the great Park, St. James' Park—men marching and counter-marching under the direction of old and experienced sergeants. These men were first of Kitchener's armies. It was privilege to be in London then. Mr. George, seldom unhappy in his rough Terror to Triumph, in writing of the war recovery of the country, the conditions of that early period—and so the England—of the months of 1914, was a London of spirit and high courage; a London whose heart and soul and mind concentrated on the mighty and creative work to be done. It was a city—a city that typified a nation and a past and saw in itself only the more urgent need for aggressive measures. London unified the spirit of the race."

Great Voluntary Response.

Glasgow looked down upon it with an ease, if unexpressed notion of superiority, and raced higher enlistment. Little Wales sent its own Guards. Ireland, in a few hours of civil war, from civil strife to maintain elements of old and glorious traditions.

In thousands upon thousands surged to the colors. Companies, platoons to battalions, battalions to regiments, regiments to armies. I was witnessing the greatest voluntary response to public duty in the history of all time, in response which our friends as it dumfounded our enemies.

Britain's Military Strength.

In the winter of 1914, one of the informed men in London made an estimate for me of the probable military strength of Great Britain. After a year, returns, he said, are roughly 8,000,000 men of all ages, 25 per cent. will be required in essential industries, another 20 per cent. will be physically unfit, should raise and equip 4,000,000. Practically that whole force mustered under the voluntary system.

Such an achievement is without parallel. There is a legend of one owned dragon's teeth and armed sprang up from the ground, equipped. These men did not come from the ground. They were fully equipped. A nation called, armed with a mighty brain and might, followed until Derby's succeeded Kitchener's and continually closed the net on the world remained. To-day, over 5,000,000 have enlisted in Great Britain.

Five million men—legion to a giant host, the equivalent of an infantry calculation of battalions—5 battalions a day, every day of the year—practically, every day for 360 days. Full-blown? Slowness? It is cold.

And Britain is only reaching eight of her military power. She has more divisions on the firing line, two years and a half, marcheth from strength to strength. She is still marching.

The British Navy.

as she has marched the Navy has protected her. It has seas-to-day as it has since smashed the Armada-invincible supreme arbiter in human affairs, not forgot his in over-submarining campaigns.
