Holland Council.

Council met on Monday, 5th February. Present all the members.

The Reeve reported that he had appointed A. G. Chisholm Auditor instead of Mr. Price, who was unable to act. The Council endorsed his action.

Report of the Board of Health was received, recommending payment to Daniel Telford of \$5.00 on account as Sanitary Inspector.

Applications for position of Treasurer were received from Wm. Hampton and J. N. Perdue. The Auditors' report was read and adopted, showing receipts for 1916 \$29044.23, Expenditure \$25186.61, Assets Dec. 31, 1916 \$3745.20; Liabilities, None. The Clerk was instructed to have 100 copies printed.

John C. Baird was appointed Trustee for Chatsworth High School, and Wm. Hampton was appointed Treasurer, providing the sureties are satisfactory. The Reeve was instructed to investigate, and report on same.

The Ward appropriation was fixed at \$175.00, and not more than \$5000 to each Township boundary. Orders issued on Treasurer amounted to \$181.60.

Council meets again on Monday, 5th March, when Pathmasters, Poundkeepers, and Fenceviewers will be appointed.

Osprey Council.

Feversham, Feb. 10, 1917. On the above date the members of the Municipal Council of Osprey met at Feversham, according to adjournment from Jan. 8 last.

The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Communications, accounts, etc., were received from Thos. Heppenstall, acct., \$6.50; Post Stamps to Clerk; Municipal World, acct., \$25.30; Municipal Stationery; Co. Treasurer, list of lands liable to be sold for arrears of taxes in 1917 Report of Committee regarding Treasurer's security. Reports from the Auditors on accounts of 1916. Isaac Traynor, C.E., accounts for service as engineer; Isaac Scott, acct., \$8.40, for gravel; Mrs. Hanbury, claiming illegal sale of her lands for taxes; David Wood, claim for land taken for deviation road on 30th sideroad con. 10. J. A. Kernahan, acct., \$1.75, exchange on Cheques and \$1.15 for cement for culvert.

Orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay Hugh Fenwick, \$1.50, refund of statute labor; Isaac Scott, \$8.40, gravel; Thos. Scott, \$1.05, express and carriage; Thos. Heppenstall, \$6.50; Post stamps to Clerk; Municipal World, \$25.30; stationery; J. A. Kernahan, \$1.15, cement, and \$1.75, exchange on cheques; Alex. Douglas \$12.00; Robert Heron \$12.00, as Auditors.

That the report of the Auditors be adopted and that the Clerk get 300 copies printed. The Clerk instructed the Township Engineer to make an examination and report as to the proper place for the culvert at the corner of 30th sideroad, cons. 2 and 3, N.D.E., and notify the parties interested.

Each Road Commissioner was instructed to see that no timber was cut upon the highway of their Divisions without proper authority.

\$300 was appropriated to each of the five road divisions, and all accounts for gravel funds. The Reeve was instructed to have Elizabeth Ottewill, an indigent, sent to the House of Refuge.

By-law No. 636 was passed, appointing Road Commissioner as follows: Div. No. 1, Geo. W. Ross; Div. No. 2, W. H. Guy; Div. No. 3, John Thomson; Div. No. 4, Jos. Henderson; Div. No. 5, John Lockhart.

Council adjourned to meet at Southampton on March 3rd next. Thos. Scott, Clerk.

Obituary.

Mr. Samuel Smart passed peacefully to his reward on Feb. 20th, at the age of 85 years.

Deceased was born in County Cavan, Ireland, in the year 1833. At the age of nine he came with his parents to Canada and settled in the Township of Cartwright. In later years he moved to Holland Township. There he met and married Miss Mary Jane Bell. Later he moved to Artemesia and from there to Ephrasia, and after the death of his wife, who predeceased him nine years ago, he resided with his son, Samuel, in Ephrasia.

He leaves to mourn his demise four sons and one daughter, Thos. Samuel and John, all of Ephrasia; William, of Glenora; and Mrs. George Pedlar, Markdale, all of whom were present at the funeral. Mrs. S. McClung and Mrs. A. Ferguson have predeceased him some years.

The Department of Agriculture will help you

The Ontario Department of Agriculture appeals to Horticultural Societies to devote at least one evening meeting to the subject of vegetable growing; manufacturers, unions, lodges, school boards, etc., are invited to actively encourage home gardening. Let the slogan for the year be "A vegetable garden for every home."

Organizations are requested to arrange for instructive talks by practical gardeners on the subject of vegetable growing. In cases where it is impossible to secure suitable local speakers, the Department of Agriculture will, on request, send a suitable man.

The demand for speakers will be great. The number of available experts being limited, the Department urgently requests that arrangements for meetings be made at once; if local speakers cannot be secured, send applications promptly.

The Department suggests the formation of local organizations to stimulate the work by offering prizes for best vegetable gardens. It is requested to assist in any possible way any organization that may be conducting a campaign for vegetable production of vacant lots. It will do so by sending speakers, or by supplying expert advice in the form of leaflets.

To any one interested, the Department of Agriculture will send literature giving instructions about implements necessary and methods of preparing the ground and cultivating the crop. A plan of a vegetable garden indicating suitable crops to grow, best varieties and their arrangement in the garden, will be sent free of charge to any address.
