the deceased for thirty years, and
was delighted to spend a couple of
hours with him on Thursday eve-
ning last, and to accompany him
as far as Saugeen Junction on
Friday evening on his return home
to Durham. We hope to give a
more extended notice next week.
Mr. Campbell was beloved by
both pupils and teachers gener-
ally. Markdale School was dismis-
ed at 2:30 Tuesday, the hour of his
funeral.

Death of John J. Cook.

In the death of John J. Cook,
which took place at his home near
Rocklyn on Tuesday morning last,
Euphrasia township loses one of
its much respected citizens. About
two months ago deceased suffered
from an attack of pneumonia, but
recovered, and was able to be out.
Afterwards he complained of in-
ward trouble, which grew so se-
rious that an operation performed
by Drs. McPaul and Miller revealed
the trouble to be tuberculosis of
the bowels, for which there was
no remedy. Deceased was a man
very widely known, and was as-
sociated in every movement for
the benefit of the community. He
ably discharged the duties of Direc-
tor and Vice President of the Agri-
cultural Society for about 20
years, was an energetic worker of
the A.O.U.W. for over 20 years, a
member of the township Council,
and prominent member of the Or-
ange Association.

Deceased was twice married, his
first wife was Miss Eliza Perry, to
whom he is survived by three chil-
dren, Ed, of (Czar, Sask., Earl, of
Rocklyn, and Isabella, of Collingwood.
His second wife, who survives him,
was Sarah Morwood. Four chil-
dren survive this union. The fune-
ral took place on Thursday last,
the Rev. T. W. Lane, of Rocklyn,
conducted service at the house and
grave. The last sad rites were car-
ried out by the members of the
Orange Order.

The pall bearers were Messrs. W.
R. Perry, Harold Ellis, Harold
Kerr, J. A. Perry, Jos. Menarey,
James Murray.

OBITUARY

The death of Mary Gardner, be-
loved wife of the late James Rice,
on Tuesday morning, after a short
illness, came as a shock to her
relatives of this part. Having
visited with her brothers and sis-
ters for the past winter, and
while waiting the arrival of her
eldest son, Thomas, who was to
have accompanied her home. She
was taken suddenly ill before the
son's arrival, and although all
was done that Doctors' skill could
do, she passed peacefully away at
the home of her brother, James
Gardner, of Clarksburg, on Tues-
day, March 29th. Deceased was
born near Brampton in the year
1845, and at the age of two years
moved with her parents, the late
Mr. and Mrs. Gardner to the vil-
lage of Rocklyn, where in the year

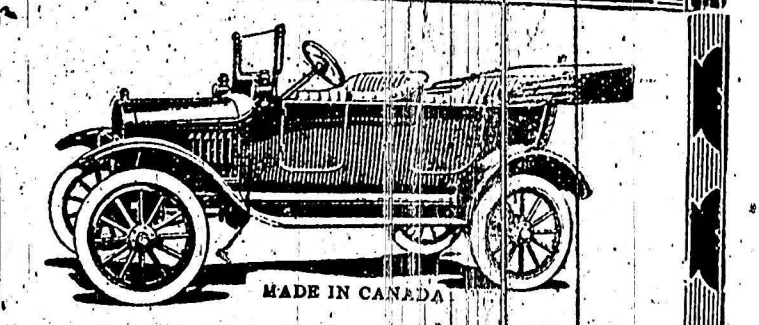
