Vimy, St. Julien, Ypres

Vimy takes its place beside St. Ypres in the list of glorious achievements by the Canadian army in France. What a wonder-Department of Education fully stimulating thing it is to helping the farmer and his wife der with the finest troops in the world has yet witnessed, for the est tests that the fortunes of war apply to their courage and their efficiency.

The taking of Viny Ridge stands out to-day as the most sensational achievement of the Canadian forces, but it does not outclass what was done at St. Julien and in the Y pres sallent. Vimy is a great victory in the drive of 1917, but the little hand of men who met the first gas attack, and held up vastly superior forces whose objective was Caldis, rendered a service that has no parallel, and will have no parallel, in the history of this war. If the Teutonic forces had broken through and reached Calais, whence they could dominate the English Channel, it would have been a disaster as great as the capitalation of Paris. The men who stood in the way and by their heroism prevented the accomplishment of that design by the Germans, should have their names placed high on the Roll of Honor among all the British soldiers who have fought in this war. As time passes and one terrible task after another confronts the Canadians, they show themselves equal to every emergency. It is their British blood that tells. The lives that are taken and the blood that they shed will fertilize the loyalty and patriotism of the Canadian people. They are showing to the world that Canada counts: that among all the marvellous re-sources with which providence has endowed this Dominion, the manhood of the country ranks first. 
