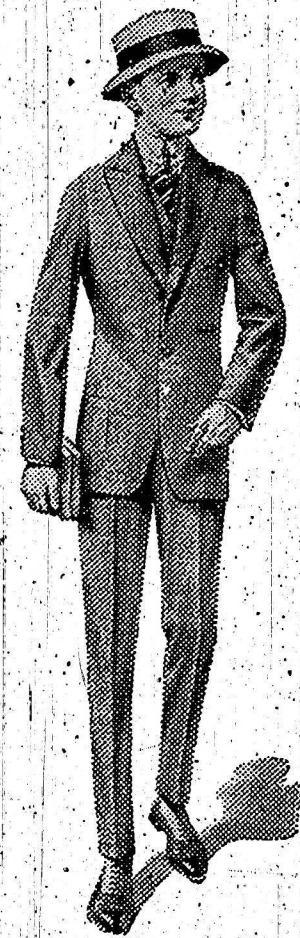


Boys' First Long Pant Suits

Artemesia Council.

The Council of the Township of Artemesia met at the town hall, Fiesherston, on the 7th day of April, 1917. The members were all present, Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: Mr. G. A. Pietrian, re representative to the Board of Agriculture; Ben H. Spence, with petition to Dominion Government in regard to prohibition of liquor traffic; the auditors presented their report on the accounts of 1916; the Reeve, by-laws No. 9 to authorize a loan by debentures to S.S. No. 13; No. 10 to authorize loan for current expenditure of the high school, were introduced and passed. Cameron-Stinson-That the Reeve and clerk are hereby authorized on behalf of the township of Artemesia to sign the petition from the Dominion Alliance asking for dominion prohibition and other conditions therein contained.-Car. Burnett-Mathewson-That the acct. of Wright & Telford for legal service in 1916, \$2.00 be paid.-Carried. Mathewson-Burnett-That the auditors' report for 1916, as submitted, showing balance of \$2116.11, be received and adopted and one hundred copies be printed for distribution.-Carried. Cameron-Burnett-That the Reeve and Messrs. Stinson and Burnett be a committee to investigate the claim of Jeanette Neilson presented by her solicitors from alleged flooding of her lands from highway and to report at next meeting of Council.-Carried. Cameron-Stinson-That the request for permission to erect a building on the N.E. corner of town hall grounds for fire apparatus be granted.-Carried. Cameron-Mathewson-That the report of the Reeve on valley road expenditure of \$101.49 be received and he be paid \$16.25 for six and a half days overseeing work on same.-Carried. Mathewson-Cameron-That Messrs. Stinson and Cameron be a committee to enquire into and report upon the advisability and cost of erecting a snow fence on the station hill.-Carried. Cameron-Mathewson-That \$1800 is hereby appropriated to be expended on roads and bridges within this township to be divided as follows: Div. No. 1, \$400, Div.

Mortley be appointed Pathmaster in place of Alex. Wilson resigned.-Carried. Black-McInnis-That John O'Neil be paid \$10 for plowing road on 2nd con. and sideline 20.-Car. Peart-Black-That Jerry Moasey be paid \$6 for plowing Road to Markdale.-Carried. Peart-Turnbull-That William Sweeney be paid \$3.00 for plowing road in 5 beats.-Carried. Recipes for Killing Flies

The following suggestion for the destruction of house flies is made: Formaldehyde and sodium salicylate are the two best fly poisons. Both are superior to arsenic. They have their advantages for household use. They are not a poison to children; they are convenient to handle, their dilutions are simple and they attract the flies.

Preparation of Solutions.
A formaldehyde solution of approximately the correct strength may be made by adding 3 teaspoonfuls of the concentrated formaldehyde solution, commercially known as formalin, to a pint of water. Similarly, the proper concentration of sodium salicylate may be obtained by dissolving 3 teaspoonfuls of the pure chemical (a powder) to a pint of water.

A container (here described) has been found convenient for automatically keeping the solution always available for flies to drink. An ordinary, thin-walled drinking glass is filled, or partially filled with the solution. A saucer, or small plate, in which is placed a piece of WHITE blotting paper cut the size of the dish, is put bottom up over the glass. The whole is then quickly inverted, a match placed under the edge of the glass, and the container is ready for use. As the solution dries, out of the saucer the liquid seal at the edge of the glass is broken and more liquid flows into the lower receptacle. Thus the paper is always kept moist.

Any odor pleasing to man is offensive to the fly and will drive them away.

How Sgt. Sutherland Died.

Capt. Fraser (Dr. Thurlow Fraser, who recently returned to Owen Sound, after ten months in the trenches), has brought the first authentic story of the death of Sgt. Sutherland, of Holland. On the 17th of January Sgt. Sutherland participated in an early morning trench raid upon the lines of the enemy, during which an even hundred German prisoners were captured, the largest number taken up to that time in one of these raids. During the fracas, Sutherland was wounded, and two German prisoners undertook to carry him back to the Canadian lines. They were so engaged when a German "Rum Jar"—a shell from a trench mortar—came over and killed outright one of the prisoners helping Sgt. Sutherland to the other that he died shortly afterwards. Sgt. Sutherland also received additional serious wounds that caused his death, two days later at the casualty clearing station at Donny. He would probably have recovered from his original wound.
