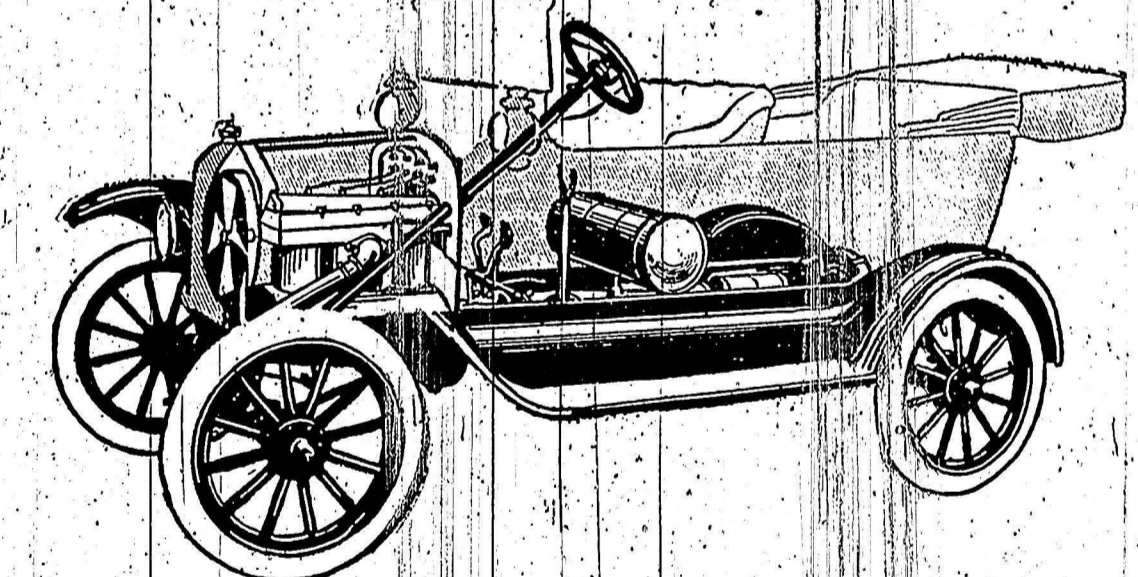
Messrs. J. W. Ford, T. J. Fowler and Dr. Shepherdson, of this district were in attendance.
