lead shields: These are little hats of pliable lead resembling more than

over each nipple. The inventor claims that their value rests in the forma-tion of a lactate of lead which is antiseptic (that is a destructive agent to

germs). While this may be so I am satisfied that the protection against the friction of the clothing and the action of dirt is quite important. In a

long experience I have found the use of these shields a sure preventive

against the cracking of the nipples with the attendant pain and infection. If cracks do occur it is useful to wash them with 70 per cent. alcohol and paint with compound tincture of benzoin (Friar's Balsam) twice a day.

Until the cracks are healed the baby should be nursed through a rubber-

topped hipple shield, which must be carefully washed and cleansed with boiling water and bicarbonate of soda before and after each nursing.
