Richardson, re Trueman's hill; the Reeve and Mr. Mathewson, report on bridge 10-12 con.; Sawyer-Massey Co. account for scrapers, \$94.50; Gilson Collinson, account for committed statute labour at Caylon; G. Pritchard account repairs to Grader, \$1.75; A. Hergott, \$3.10; Fred Wickens, claim for sheep killed by dogs, \$12.; C. Akins, claim of \$40; damages for backing water on lot 133, con. 1 S. W. 1; Bylaws No. 12 to appoint Dr. McLean as M. H. G. 13 to appoint R. Best as high school trustee and to authorize the borrowing of money for current expenditure, were introduced, and passed their final reading.
