Manarey—Gaudin. That the Treasurer receive from A. L. Walker the sum of 65 cents taxes for 1916, and that the clerk have the same erased from the County Treasurer's Books.—Carried.

Manarey—Gaudin.—That the Clerk send a copy of the report of the accountants, appointed by the commissioners of the Beaver Valley Telephone System and the Council to the Railway Board, and the request that the Books of the Telephone System be produced to the accountants.—Carried.

Murray—Manarey.—That the Reeve, Patton and Clerk be a com-

mittee to take measurements of the deviation on 24 and 25 side road, con. 6, with a view of having a By-Law passed closing the road and conveying the same to Samuel Gilmore.—Carried.

Murray—Patton.—That the Clerk be instructed to notify the clerk of St. Vincent to have the Beaver Valley Telephone rates paid over at once.—Carried.

Manarey—Murray.—That J. Comack be appointed collector of rates for the easterly five concessions of the Township for the year 1917, and that he receive the sum of \$70 for his services.—Carried.

Murray—Manarey.—That Harold Kerr be appointed collector of rates for the westerly seven concessions for the year 1917.—Carried.

Manarey—Gaudin.—That the Reeve consult W. D. Henry in Suit, Patton. Euphrasia vs. A. Clark.—Carried.

Murray—Patton.—That the Reeve consult Burnie, K. C. Collingwood, in Suit Patton, Euphrasia vs. A. Clark.—Lost.

By-Law, No. 7, appointing J. Comack, Collector, was passed and filed. Knott, for 30 hrs. of man, \$6.00; Jas. Boyd, for right of way to Meyers gravel pit for 2 years, \$5.00; Jeff. Rennie, to pay for gravel and work in his road division, \$8.50; H. V. Gaudin, for one day commission work, \$2.00; J. R. Fawcett, for truss rod for Julian's Bridge, \$4.50; Wm. W. Gouch, for 49 yds. gravel, \$7.35; Dougal Smith, salary as collector, \$73.30; T. H.
