These photographs, when developed and examined under a magnifying glass, reveal every secret that cannot be carefully hidden. For example a bright light will shine along the op of every cannon and reveal its enplacement. So the artist cores along with his paintbrush, paints a black streak along this high light and a gray streak at either side, with white paint where the shadows would naturally come underneath, thus te versing the modeling of nature and flattening the object out. A few colored streaks to confuse the form of the object, and the cannon is effectual.

ly diguised even from the camera. Motor trucks artillery wagon are painted with broken patches green in summer and with white in winter so as to conceal both their form and their color. 

HOUSEFLY AGAIN INDICTED Drying and Canning Season Is Time of Special Danger.

The menace of the housefly is at resent greatly increased, because of ome drying, preserving and canning fruits and vegetables.

The housefly has long been con-lemned as a spreader of disease, beng incriminated both by circumstanial and by experimental evidence. The structure of its feet and mouth parts-in particular the presence of mall hairy pads on the feet which are overed with a sticky fluid, enabling he fly to walk upon walls and ceiling -makes it possible for any sort of ilth to cling to the fly.

It is high time that universal efforts ere made to eliminate houseflys by bermanent methods, such as controlng their breeding places. . For the resent season it is imperative that nergency measures be adopted for protection. Efficient screening is the est, emergency protection.

Special attention ought to be given excluding flies from contact with dried fruits and fruits in the process drying, in particular such fruits as are likely to be eaten without being horoughly cooked. This may be done building a wooden framework bout the trays and stretching over the top of this metal or cloth screening, in such a way that the screen will be a few inches above the fruit.


