been examined by the Medical Board  
at Owen Sound and of these 1794  
have been classified. 1067 have been  
classed "A", 200 are in "B", 203  
have been classed "C", and 324 have  
been placed in "E". Every one must  
report to a local postmaster by Saturday  
next, either to claim exemption  
or apply for service. Otherwise they
