Many Examined.—Over 1800 have been examined by the Medical Board at Owen Sound and of these 1794 have been classified. 1067 have been classed "A", 200 are in "B", 293 have been classed "C", and 324 have been placed in "E". Every one must report to a local postmaster by Saturday next, either to claim exemption or apply for service. Otherwise they are automatically made a part of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and are liable to be dealt with as absent without leave.—Owen Sound Sun.

doubtless received official notification of the death of your son Pte. T. T. Martin, 474101, who was killed in the severe engagement in which his Battalion took part on the evening of the 6th September. The report was "missing, believed killed, but as a couple of his comrades lay him lying dead there is no question about his sad fate. In his company your son had endeared himself to his comrades, and earned the respect and confidence of

his officers for his personal and soldierly qualities. He died as a brave soldier should—in faithful discharge of a difficult duty—a credit alike to his Mother and his Country. ## EXEMPTION TRIBUNALS

MILITARY SERVICE ACT 1917

For the Attention of Class One Men

The location of The Exemption Tribunals in this district is as follows:—

Tribunal Ont. No. 86 - Markdale  
No. 90 - Owen Sound  
No. 91 - Owen Sound

These Tribunals will commence to deal with claims for exemption on November 8th.

All claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.

Those who make or have made their claim for exemption in writing through the Post Office will receive notice by registered letter of date on which their claim will be dealt with.

Those who neglect to make use of the Post Office must present themselves in person at a Tribunal on November 8th, 9th or 10th, and they will then be informed as to when their claims will be dealt with.

Reports for service must be made on or before November 10th through the Post Office.

Severe penalties are provided by law for failure to report for service or claim exemption as above.
