The following communications were read: British Red Cross acknowledging receipt of notice of grant, the Navy League the same; Clerk of Ephrasia, re telephone service; T. Nichol and T. Ferguson personally asked for a grant to Priceville Agricultural Society, W. A. Hawken on behalf of East Grey Agricultural Society asked for a grant for same; J. C. Wright, account for ditching on west back line; C. Ekins and Harry Johnston, claim for sheep killed by dogs certified by valuers.

Commissioners reports as follows: A Cameron, Div. 4 to Trueman's hill; F. Mathewson, Div. 2 to 12th Bridge; T. J. Stinson, Div. 3 and Collingwood Road; the Reeve's report on Valley Road and horse shoe hill.

Cameron—Stinson—That Reeve's report on work on the Valley Road showing expenditure of \$157.70 be received and he be paid \$157.77 commission on the same, also his report re horse shoe hill, repairs amounting to \$12.25 and he be paid \$2.50 for overseeing the same.—Carried.

Burnett—Stinson—That the report of Mr. Mathewson be received and he be paid \$7.90 commission on expenditure of \$79.00, and \$2.50 for one day overseeing special work.—Carried.
