Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since been a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made in certain conditions. Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 60 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. Patent, if cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house on it. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for sale, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Efficient War-Time Agriculture.

One of the nations that, on account of its location, has had to practice strictest economy, is Holland. The Dutch have always been in the lead in frugality.

Little Holland—in area only one-twenty-fifth that of Ontario—maintains a population nearly equal to Canada.

Holland—the home of the dairy cow—has done wonders in the direction of maintaining and increasing the land which the noble little nation, with almost superhuman energy, wrested from the sea. Every bit of stock manure is carefully returned to the land.

The Dutch maintain over 2,390,000 head of cattle as well as considerable other livestock. As a consequence Holland has a great source of plantfood in the livestock manure.

In addition to this home supply of plantfood—the livestock manure—Holland imports large quantities of fertilizers. Holland is usually held up as an example of a land in which fertility is maintained by the keeping of cattle. It will surprise those who have made this claim to know that

Holland in 1914 imported 833,198 tons of fertilizers carrying nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash, enough to supply 310 pounds of fertilizer to each cultivated acre.

The Dutch government recently placed orders for 40,000 tons of acid phosphate although since the war broke out Holland has imported fertilizers with great difficulty. On one shipment which was loading at an eastern U.S. port recently, Holland is paying \$40.00 per ton freight for acid phosphate which carries available phosphoric acid; on another shipment she paid \$34.00 a ton freight.

Does it pay? Let the average yield of crops per acre answer.

Crop	Holland	Canada
Wheat	39 bus.	19.3 bus.
Barley	45 bus.	31.2 bus.
Potatoes	290.2 bus.	186 bus.

Such yields in this country would mean paying rates of interest on money invested in high priced farm lands. It would mean a growing agriculture, commensurate with the growth of the Canadian population. It is good business!

Lulu.—1. Three little plays for children's acting, which are good patriotic stuff, are: A Canadian Fairy Tale, The Making of Canada's Flag; and The Key to Jack Canuck's Treasure-house. 2. A scrim curtain in white or ecru is inexpensive and makes a very dainty curtain for a bedroom. A little cross-stitch border of pink and blue ribbon that comes especially for embroidering finishes off the curtain. In the shops made-up scrim curtains can be bought with draw-work borders. These are pretty. Dotted Swiss curtains are as sweet and dainty as can be. A tiny border finishes off the edge of these. Figured lawn, too, is pretty if there is a plain wallpaper in the room. Otherwise use plain unfigured lawn. 3. The Tale of Two Cities and David Copperfield, by Dickens, very carefully read, might help to improve one's English. 4. "Mother," by Kathleen Norris, would be a suitable gift for a girl of eighteen. 5. One of the most welcome gifts to the military hospitals in England and France are seraf books which serve to entertain men who are too weak to enjoy reading very much. They are made on sheets 43 x 27 inches, folded three times, and form a book of sixteen pages, convenient in size. The book is tied together at the back by a bright colored ribbon. The cover picture of the book is colored, and the book contains pictures, both black and colored, little anecdotes, very short stories, short poems and jokes. The pictures must be placed straight on each page, as many men would be too weak to turn the book around to see a picture pasted in sideways. In selecting the pictures, one must remember, of course, that they are for grown men, and not for children.

Children's Stories from Dickens, The Water Babies, A Child's Garden of Verses, The Real Mother Goose, The Red Book of War, Anne's House of Dread, Under French's Command. Then there is the "Every Child Should Know" series, a collection of unusual merit, that holds the interest while it educates and broadens the child's mind. They are well illustrated. The series includes: Birds Every Child Should Know, Famous Stories Every Child Should Know, Heroes Every Child Should Know, and many others. A splendid book on the war is "The Children's Story of the War." It is beautifully illustrated. 3. Oleomargarine is composed of beef fats and vegetable fats. By vegetable fats is meant those made from coconut, peanuts, olive and refined cottonseed oils. 4. The white of an egg added to thin cream will make it whip more quickly and will produce a thick, fluffy cream. Inquirer:—1. Patent leather is not recommended for children's shoes. Calf is much more durable. 2. Recipe for French Cake: Mix a quarter of a cup of butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 2 cups seeded raisins and half a teaspoon salt in a saucepan; bring to the boiling point and boil for five minutes; cool and add 1 teaspoon powdered cinnamon, 1 teaspoon powdered mace, 1 teaspoon soda and 2 cups flour sifted together; beat well; pour into a well greased and papered bread pan and bake in a slow oven for one hour. 3. Obtain commercial fertilizer from the florist and apply to your Christmas cactus. 4. It would be much more satisfactory to send your white velvet hat to a cleaner to be dry cleaned, than to attempt to do it yourself. 5. All fruit jars should be enclosed in paper bags before being placed in the fruit cupboard. This keeps the jars free from dust and excludes the light, thus preserving the color of the fruit as well as the fruit itself.

26,869 PRISONERS CAPTURED IN NOVEMBER

London, Dec. 3.—According to figures given out by the War Office tonight the British captured on all fronts in the month of November, 26,869 prisoners and 221 guns. Of these captured 11,551 men and 138 guns were taken on the western front; 10,441 men and eighty guns in Palestine; and 4,403 men and three guns in East Africa.

Rural Development.

The report on Rural Planning and Development just published by the Commission of Conservation is an epoch-making work and should be in the hands of all public-spirited citizens interested in this important problem of national policy.

GERMANY HAS NO COLONIES

East Africa Entirely Cleared of Enemy—British and Belgian Prize.

London, Dec. 3.—"East Africa has been completely cleared of the enemy." This official announcement was made tonight.

The text of the announcement reads: "Telegraphing under date of December 1, General Vandevanter (commander of the military forces in East Africa) has reported that reconnaissance have definitely established that German East Africa is completely cleared of the enemy. This the whole of German overseas possessions have passed into our hands and those of our Belgian allies. Only a small German force now remains. This has taken refuge in adjoining Portuguese territory and measures are being taken to deal with it."

With the loss of East Africa all of her colonies have been taken from Germany. These had an area of more than one million square miles, and a population of about 14,000,000, including 25,000 whites. German East Africa has a coastline of 620 miles and an estimated area of 384,000 square miles.
