Besides looking after the boys on leave, the ladies keep a complete list of Grey men who are reported wound ed, the date and nature of their wounds, the hospital they are in, etc. Visits are paid to the men whenever possible, even if it should entail an overnight or long rail journey. Sometimes the most pressing need of wounded man-money-is supplied by the visiting ladies, who, of course, always receive re-payment of the loan which they so gladly give. Though this is anything but a des-

ription which is going to finish up with an appeal for financial aid, which has never once been asked for by those who opened the rooms, it may be mentioned that several Grey people have sent contributions to a work which indirectly is of great benefit to them. As one who knows the work done at the Rooms, once said There are women in this County who should thank God most devoutly that those Rooms were opened, for they saved their sons from unutterable things." Many realize this, and one merely mentions the fact that such contributions have been made, Since Mrs. Malone told her story, one cheque for \$25.00 was sent in grateful appreciation of the help given to an Owen Sound boy.

Many thoughts have gone across the sea to the Grey Rooms since the news of Mrs. Eaton's sore bereavement was born to her friends in Grey County. Letters from her this week say that she will continue her work there, as she says it is worth while, and that coming home would og impossible just now. Everyone will hope that she will have strength to go on with her work, and that the ladies associated with her may also continue a task, which is so well

(Observer, in the Star.) Had the government been keen or the game of politics, and careless about the true welfare of the Dominion, it would not have passed the Military Service Bill. but instead would have got all the men required by enforcing the Militia Act passed by Sir Wilfred Laurier when in power. There could have been no opposition from Liberals to the enforcement of their own Conscription law for overseas Service. But, have just been reading that Act of 1906, with its provisions "that if any time enough men do not volunteer towatered, three miles from Markdale, it was even more interesting to have complete the quota required"—for "active service anywhere in Canada and also beyond Canada"-"the menso liable to serve"-"all male inhabitants of Canada, of the age of eighteen years and upwards, and under sixty, not exempt or disqualified by law"--"shall be drafted by ballot." It would have been hard upon some families to have lost their only breadwinner, it would have hindered the war to allow the ballot to send to the front a man useful, say, in making ammunition, in building ships, or on land, while leaving at home the street corner loafer, or the young parasitical idler about the picture shows! Rather, evdently, than cripple the ountry that way, the Government adopted the plan which has worked well and fairly in Great Britain, under which men who understand local conditions, act in tribunal and decide who among the young unmarried men that have obtained the age of twenty years and were home not earlier than the year of 1883," are least needed at home and can therefore best go to the war. All my quotations are directly from the Acts of Parliament, and I thing bear out my contentions. We have got to keep our regiments to strength, in spite of the wasteage of war through sickness, wounds, capture or death. If not, what of the hole that would be

left"in the lines of defence? What of the lives of the survivors, diminished, unable to hold back the enemy, unsupported and beaten down or back? Our men must not be deserted that way. In any case, why should not every young unencumbered Canadian, face what other have had to face in defence of our country, Empire, homes, mothers, sisters and sweethearts? So the Military Service Act became law by the votes of our chosen representatives, to avoid putting the Militia Act of Conscription in force, and to send to the front those whom their friends and neighbours judged to be most readily available. But if the late Government had simply wanted to remain in power, they would have enforced the Militia Act, and let the ballot only decide who under sixty years of age, no matter
