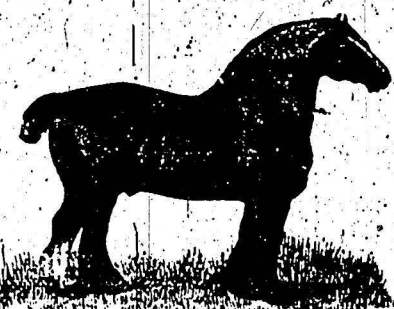

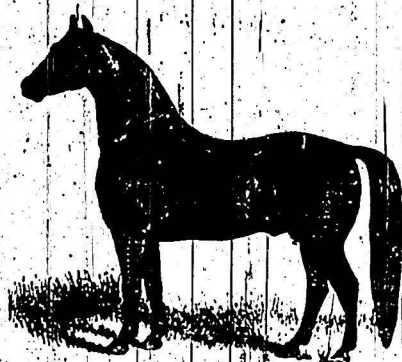

Dear Friend.—It is with great pleasure that your fellow citizens welcome you back to your native township. Two years ago, of your own free will, you nobly responded to the call of the Empire to fight for King and Country. As far as health and circumstances have permitted, you have shared in the great world struggle for human liberty and justice. 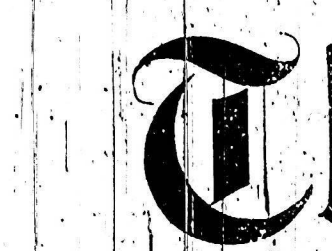
