It is said that Sand yede dogs have actually saved the guns to which they were harnessed they carry shells, and even draw sleighs and light transport. Perhaps nost important of all are the messen ger dogs, which can travel where cannot go, and exceed any other senger except the pigeon in They travel through the barrage ing 23 or 24 miles an hour, and are, iterally, "faithful unto death," striv ing even when wounded to perform their alloted task. No one would ques tion for an instant the fine apprecia tion which has caused the French Gov erhment to "mention" its dogs in despatches.

So far, over 1,000 dogs have been treated at the hospitals. All operaed under anaesthetics by trained veterinarians. 
