### VICTORY LOAN

Canada is about to raise another big loan. The bonds will bear 5 1/2 % interest. The canvass will begin next Monday, October 28th, and end three weeks later, November 16th. The bonds will be "five-year" and "fifteen-year". The money is to be used solely for war purposes, and will be spent wholly in Canada. Payment may be made in five instalments as follows: 10% on application, 20% on December 6, 1918; 20% on January 6, 1919; 20% on February 6, 1919, and 31.16% on March 6, 1919. The bonds will not be subject to any income tax levied by the government of Canada. The amount apportioned to Markdale district is \$175,000. The local organization is as follows: Captain, Hugh Mercer; Advisory Board, Dr. Ego, F. T. Hill and C. W. Rutledge; Canvassers, J. E. Thibaut, R. T. Edwards, W. J. Purvis and C. G. Devitt.
