Zion bridge, expended \$112.56. Accounts paid: F. Pedlar, gravel, \$5.50; sheep killed, N. Piper, \$46. J. Little \$22, F. Taylor \$19, J. McKee \$9, Sam Pedlar \$33, A. Hergett, repairing grader, \$9; J. Paul, burial of R. Cooper, \$40; the Reeve, overseeing work on Mt. Zion bridge, \$12; grants were made to Pricewill and East Grey Agricultural Societies of \$15 each; Mr. Batchelor, overseeing work 270th sideroad, \$3, the Reeve on same \$1.50.

Batchelor — Burnett — That the Clerk notify the H. E. P. C. regarding condition of road on 35th sideroad as it is now completely worked up to the stones and almost unfit for travel and should have a load of gravel as soon as possible—Carried.

Cameron — Batchelor — That the Reeve and Clerk be a committee to arrange a meeting with Markdale Council to arrive at some agreement in regard to provision of money to pay off the Davis and Mercer hills for Hydro Electric service.—Carried.
