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FUNERAL OF J. GORDON HILL

The funeral of the late J. Gordon Hill took place on Monday afternoon from the residence of his mother, "Himeres," to Markdale Public Cemetery. The body arrived in Markdale, accompanied by his wife, on Friday evening, November 29, having left Humboldt on the 26th.

It is a becoming tribute to the Hill family that the C. P. held the Owen Sound train at Toronto for thirty-five minutes in order that the body might be transferred from the Western train, and the act of courtesy is fully appreciated.

In conversation with the widow, Mrs. Gordon Hill, we gathered some of the particulars regarding the closing days of her husband's life. The unselfish and self-forgetful disposition of Gordon was exemplified in an incident at the hotel in Tisdale, to which he was taken after being overcome by the flu.

The funeral was largely attended. The floral tributes consisted of two beautiful wreaths from the family and the widow.

The pall bearers were: Mr. J. A. McArthur, Gen. Alton Harvey Lucas, C. Mercer, T. Turk and W. Noble.

Owing to the heavy strain on both Mrs. Hill, sr., and Mrs. Gordon Hill, which threatened their collapse, it was deemed wise to have the service private instead of a public character.
