

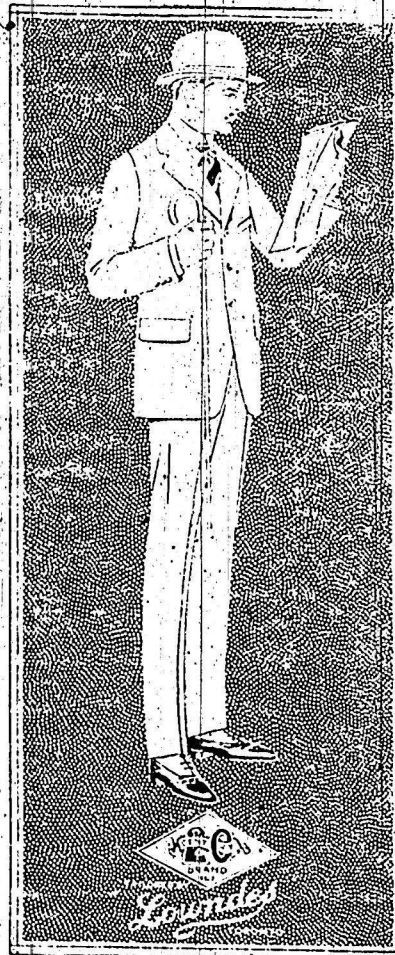

The Council met November 16th, as per adjournment, all members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications as follows: E. L. Cousins, re fuel; T. J. Hannigan, Good Roads; James P. Hare, with resolution from Holland Township; W. J. Ritchie, re wire fence; John J. McFadden, re washout; A. J. McVicar, heavy claim; Thos. J. Brodie, sheep claim; several fuel commissioner's circulars; W. R. Watson, and wife, deced for deviation; Samuel McDermid, wire fence; W. L. McFarland, claim for damage to car; W. J. Gager, re National Sanitarium. Black-Point—That re W. L. McFarland's account for repairs to his car through defective roads; resolved that no action be taken, as after careful investigation of road, it is found

to be in much better repair than many of the other roads in this and surrounding townships.—Carried. Orders on Treasurer were issued as follows: William Timmons, for gravel, \$4.00; D. McKechnie, balance on gravel, \$0; Municipal World, office supplies, \$13.72; John McFadden, billing washout, \$4.00; James C. Ross, for five stringers delivered, \$30; The Reeve, investigating the R. E. English claim, \$4.00; The Reeve, commission on bridge work \$3; Thos. J. Brodie, sheep killed by dogs \$18; Colin McArthur, investigating same, \$1.50; Samuel McDermid, \$4 rods of wire fence, \$21; W. J. Ritchie, 40 rods of wire fence, \$10; A. J. McVicar, heavy work, re Sarah McPherson, \$2.50; The clerk on salary, \$20; Hugh Vaughan, hauling tile and placing culvert, \$11; Thos. Morrison, brushing lot 35, con. 2, E.G.R., \$6.00. Peart—McInnis—That Thos. Turnbull be authorized to see Wm. Scarr's

The arrival of peace has created new conditions in the export of meat and products and some uncertainty in the minds of Canadian farmers as to future markets. Information in the hands of the Honorable T. A. Creerar, Minister of Agriculture, convinces him that the export market will continue to absorb at firm prices, as compared with the prices for all other agricultural products, every pound of beef, bacon and other animal products that Canada can supply. In discussing the situation the Honorable Mr. Creerar said: In view of the great scarcity of cattle and live stock of all kinds in Europe and because of the great demand for live stock and live stock products of all kinds sure to continue for some years, at least, I am going to ask the farmers and live stock men of Canada to maintain their breeding operations on a war time scale, to properly finish all feeding stock, and to conserve all good breeding females, and to still further improve their herds and flocks by using even greater care in the selection of the sire.
