OBITUARY

The death of Mr. E. E. Hicks on New Year's Day removes another of the old pioneers of this district. The deceased was born in the County of Cornwall, England, eighty-five years ago on New Year's Eve and emigrated to Canada with his parents when about nine years old and settled in the County of Northumberland near Collingwood in the Township of "Gramah" in the Township of "Gramah." He was married 62 years ago on New Year's Eve to Miss Martha Robinson and a year or two later he and his wife joined the Methodist church and has been a consistent member of the church for about 50 years and an efficient worker and local preacher for a number of years. He was also superintendent of the New England Sunday school for about twenty-six years. About 20 years ago he and his wife moved to Euphrasia township in the County of Grey and settled on the large new occupied by Clark Bros. when this district was nearly all a wilderness, and he could call some of the wild animals which were plentiful in those days.

He died about 20 years ago of a family of four survivors, George E. of Collingwood, Wm. R. of Washington territory, near Seattle, W. S. A., Mrs. M. J. Cornfield, of Epping, N. S. W., and Mrs. Ed. Wilson, of New England, with whom he spent the last few years of his life. In his younger days he was a great reader and had a peculiarly excellent memory. He was a well-to-do man, of a conservative and was exceptionally well posted on the Bible, and was shown by his knowledge of scripture until day or two of his death, he could give book, chapter and verse of the scriptures without any hesitation.

His remains were interred in New England cemetery on January 2nd, 1919, in the presence of his wife. After the burial a memorial service was held in the New England church by Rev. W. W. Lane. The pall bearers were Messrs. John T. Lawson, Kirkpatrick, H. H. Wiley, Wm. A. Morrison, J. D. McArthur and T. J. Sympathy of the numerous friends of the family is extended to them in their hour of bereavement.
