HEALTH TALK

SPANISH INFLUENZA OR GRIP

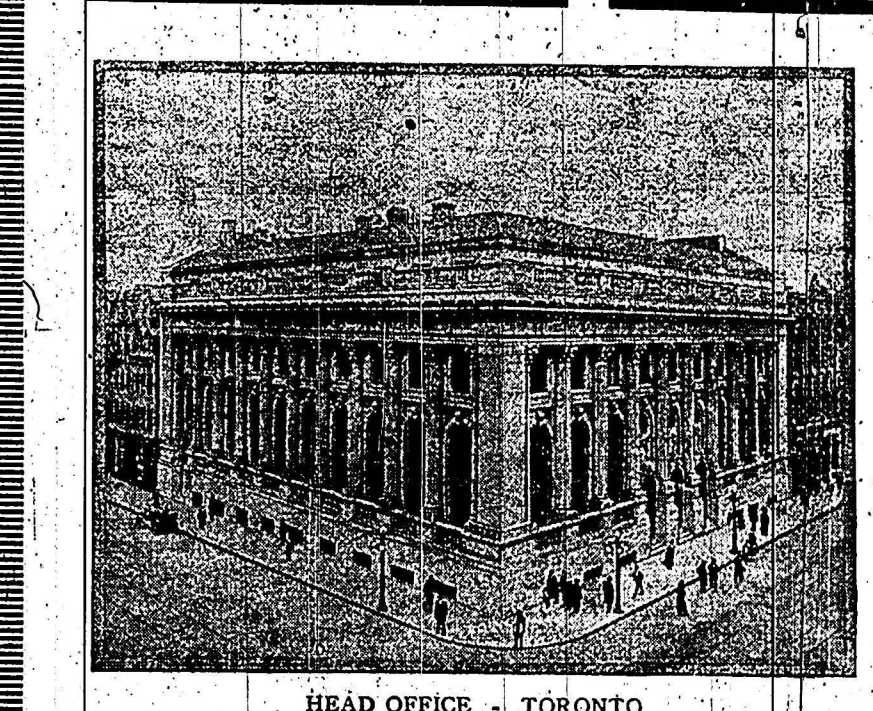
