Ali Ubud Line TO RUSSIA
At Route From London to Con-
stantinople via Brussels.

A scheme has been put forward for
what has been termed an inter-Allied
way to run from Bordeaux to Odessa via Lyons, Turin, Milan, Venice,
Trieste, Fiume, Agrigento, Belgrade and
Bucharest. Its primary object is the
development of communications with
Italy and so far as the traffic from
Bordeaux and the south of France is
concerned, it certainly would seem to
meet the requirements of the situa-
tion.

On the other hand, traffic with
England, the North of France, and
Belgium is not favored by the scheme,
especially in regard to Trieste. The
suggestion has heretofore been made
by Professor Carlier, of Liege University,
that a route through Switzerland and Italy should be adopted,
avoiding German territory altogether,
but linking up London, Ostend,
Brussels, Basel, Zurich, Nish, Sofia,
Adrianople and Constantinople. With
the completion of the Bagdad railway
this would then promote a through
route to the Persian Gulf.

The project necessitates a ten-mile
tunnel in Switzerland and the linking
up of two existing railways in that
country. Other links to be built are
those between Zagreb and Vardar and
Serajevo and Nish. An advantage of
this route is the facility of access to
Trieste and Venice from Basel.
