DOMINION INCOME TAX ACT

TO BE FILED IN AND FILED.

Every person who in 1918 resided or ordinarily resided in Canada and who carried on business in Canada or who was employed in Canada or carried on business in Canada or who was a shareholder in a corporation or joint stock company

WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS.

- Every unmarried person or widow or widower, with dependent children under twenty-one years of age, who during the year 1918 received over \$1,000 in all other incomes.
- All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received over \$2,000 or more.
- Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits or income exceed \$3,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1918.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.

FORM 7A. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers.
FORM 7B. By corporations and joint stock companies.
FORM 7C. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.
FORM 7D. By employers to declare return of the names of the employees, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid during the calendar year 1918 more than salaries, bonuses, commission or other remuneration during the calendar year 1918.
FORM 7E. By corporations, joint stock companies, syndicates to make return of all dividends and interest to shareholders and members during 1918. Individuals comprising partnerships must file return in the individual's capacity.

GENERAL INFORMATION.
All returns must be filed in duplicate.
Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors of Taxation and from the Post-offices at all leading centres.
Returns should be filed immediately.
Postage must be prepaid in letters and other documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.
